The Tornado took the initiative in scoring when Shangle carried the ball over after a drive of eight plays which brought them from the Ashland 47 yard line. The conversion by Gaines was good. The lead was short-lived when Louis Langer took the ball early in the second quarter and raced through tackle into the clear to go 75 yards for a touchdown.
