ASHLAND'S HOT PACK MACHINE TO BE PUT ON DISPLAY IN CITY HALL

Final preparations are underway for the launching of the Ashland campaign for the 1948 season March of Dimes which opens today, January 15th, according to co-chairmen, Don MacWhirter and Dyer Huston.

Theatre collection programs, mailing brochures, campaign stunts, merchant and school participation has been planned by the entire staff of the Ashland district.

For a rousing sendoff, there will be a parade Saturday afternoon at 2:00 p.m., starting at the Junior high school, which will feature bands and majorettes from the schools. All children are invited to dress up and join the parade, which has for its theme, the activity of normal children as compared with the restriction of the deadly polio victims. There will be no prizes for this demonstration of support of the March of Dimes, save the belief in the furthering of the campaign.

Ashland women have donated their time, according to the chairmen, and it is hoped by them that more will still give of time and energy toward the ultimate end of the contest. Mrs. Mildred Snider and Mrs. Hazel MacWhirter have together canvassed the business district for distribution of collection jars and scrolls of donation and have printed the scrolls for them.

The job of addressing the brochures is being handled by Doris Yates and Mildred Snider.

The girls went to the city office and ran the envelopes thru the addressograph machine, using the city's mailing list. Elmer Biegel, city superintendent, and Miss Grace Wold assisted the girls with this work. There were not enough brochures for the entire city's mailing list, so if anyone is contacted twice the chairmen would appreciate them passing the brochure on to someone that hasn't received one.
