The prisoner even explains his ability to send the letter by saying he is teaching in the prison school. The name and address of a friend is given to receive all communications.

Ordinarily, Mr. Eldswick said, reply to this communication will bring a three page letter, together with fake newspaper clippings and legal papers, intending to substantiate the story and arrange for travel for the victim in Mexico.

It is apparent the swindlers have in their possession lists of professional people, particularly doctors and dentists.
