State Plans New

The exact site of the new library building is still undetermined. The building may appear as a wing of Churchill Hall, extending into what is now the parking lot west of the present library and will serve as an annex. The present plan is a new building south of Churchill hall, opposite Memorial Court.

Half of the lower floor of the proposed building will be library, the other part will be for art rooms. The upper floor will be used for classrooms, having a capacity that will double present facilities. The intereior of the C. of C. Members facilities. The intereior of the the library will have movable partitions, made possible by the book shelves, for the convenience of those wishing a smaller reading room.

Construction cost of the proposed building will be \$400,000. Should the emergency bill providing for use of excess income tax funds for educational facilbegin next year. Restrictions Put On Canadian Mail

E. E. Vail, Ashland postmaster, announced today that information has been received from the postal administration of Canada that the importation of many types of merchandise into that country is either entirely prohibited or admitted only if a permit has been granted the prospective importer by the Canadian Minister of Finance.

Therefore, effective at once, postmasters are directed not to accept merchandise for mailing to Canada, unless the sender has assurance that the addressee will be permitted to receive the contents. As an exception, occasional parcels, addressed to individuals and not exceeding \$5.00 in value, containing bona fide unsolicited gifts, but no advertising matter or tobacco, will be admitted into Canada. The endorsement to be placed on these parcels by the sender is "Unsolicited Gift."
