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TEACHERS CONVEENE

Bjorlie Will Lead Panel Discussion At Educational Convention In Portland

Several Ashland teachers are planning to attend the 45 annual convention of the Oregon Education association which will be held in Portland this weekend. O. C. Bjorlie, instructor in vocal music in the Ashland schools will lead a panel discussion during the session on music in school.

Leland Linn, superintendent of schools, Mrs. Linn and daughter, Lela Fay, plan to leave Wednesday for the sessions which will take place Thursday, Friday, and Saturday.

The convention is the biggest annual gathering of teachers in Oregon, and some 3,000 are expected to crowd the large Portland Civic Auditorium to capacity.

Teachers will hear prominent lecturers and will also meet in subject-field groups to discuss their mutual teaching problems. Billed for appearances on the

program are civic leaders and prominent educational authorities. Among the speakers will be Governor John Hall; Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction; Maurice Hindus, noted author and lecturer; Senator Wayne Morse, speaking on political barriers to education for democracy; Ethel J. Alpenfels, consulting anthropologist for the Bureau for Intercultural Education, New York, and Dr. Glenn E. Snow, president of the National Education Association.

More than 20 subject-field departments will meet during the convention, and many of the prominent educational groups and colleges have scheduled luncheons and banquets for the occasion.
