TO STUDY AIRPORT SITUATION

FLIGHT ENTHUSIASTS
WELCOME TO ATTEND

A. M. Neslin, a local private pilot, stated today that a meeting will be held Friday evening at 7:30 in the Council chamber of the City Hall at which time all local flying enthusiasts are invited to attend for the purpose of devising a plan for the retention of the Ashland airport.

Neslin said that plans for retaining the airport are as yet in the theoretical stage but that in the last meeting at the city hall some 20 fliers and interested persons attended to lend their support.

Although the airport can be leased for the flat figure of \$110 per month it is the hope of the group that the airport can be permanently acquired and operated by them. Their plan of operation indicates that they can operate it profitably in their own interest as well as in the interest of the town of Ashland.

Of 104 airports in the state of Oregon licensed by the C.A.A. only 17 are located in towns larger than Ashland and according to statistics all are operating profitably except in cases where cities have been burdened with airports larger than they could handle, Neslin said.

The clarifier, one of the two in use in Oregon, breaks down the cells in the milk so that sediment does not form.

Mr. and Mrs. Brush, who bought the dairy in July from Chester Pittser, have been making additions to buildings and improving the dairy in order to make daily deliveries of Grade A milk.

A new milk house was completed this week by L. E. Taylor, the building is 26x26 of wooden frame construction with a concrete floor. The painting was done by C. E. Taylor, Valley Refrigeration handled the installation of the electric equipment, and the plumbing was done by Simpson Hardware.

In addition to the clarifier, Brush has a pasteurizer and electric bottler and capper and a boiler in the milk house.

Brush is being helped in the operation of the dairy by his son in law, Anton Mosklenko, his son, Richard Brush, and Jack Miller.
