Stevenson, and Dolores Copeland. Any girl that wishes to enter the contest may also make application at the Chamber of Commerce office or to any member of the entry committee. Bette Hampton, chairman of the contest, announced that the deadline to enter the contest would be June 15.

Again this year the Miss Ashland contest will be the initial step for local girls pointing towards the Miss America pageant in Atlantic City during late summer. Not only will this year's Miss Ashland be sent to Seaside for the Miss Oregon contest, but she and the other entrants will be given the honor of ruling over the Fourth of July festivities.
