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Newby Announces License Plans

Secretary of State Earl T. Newby has announced that plans for local county seat distribution of license plates in 1949 are being ironed out so that approximately half of the state's motorists will next year save the 25-cent temporary license sticker charge.

Newby explained that the legislature provided for the issuance of driver's licenses on a staggered basis. This made necessary the employment of secretary of state employees in most of the county seats not previously given local service by this branch of state government. "We have the employees in the county seats on essential jobs. It is our plan to have them also take on the duty of distributing license plates," Newby said.

With the help of the legislature, Newby hopes to issue license plates on the same basis as the driver's license, thus avoiding the annual rush which necessitates the hiring of many temporary employees.

Another phase of license plate distribution being given careful study by Newby is issuance of permanent plates in 1950 with date tags showing date of expiration to be clamped on the permanent plates.

Newby pointed out that for the first time license plate No. 500,000 has been ordered by the state. "Oregon is the second fastest growing state in the nation and facilities of the secretary of state's office must keep pace with the state growth."

Newby is now a candidate for republication nomination for the secretary of state post in the May 21 primary elections.

VOTERS TO DETERMINE FATE OF STASSEN AND DEWEY

Residents of nine wards of the city of Ashland will go to the polls Friday, May 21, to determine which of the Republican and which of the Democratic candidates for the various county and state offices they will support. This primary has been marked by a strong campaign for the presidential elector votes of the Oregon Republicans which has been carried on by Ex-governor Harold Stassen of Minnesota and Governor Thomas Dewey of New York.

The nine wards of the city and the polling places for each ward are as follows: No. 1, Boulevard Precinct, City Library; No. 2, City Hall; No. 3, Busch Used car sales room at the corner of Church and North Main; No. 4, The Armory; No. 5, Moore Real Estate, 74 North Main; No. 6, Faith Temple; No. 7, The Junior High school; No. 8, Washington school; and No. 9, 390 Liberty. The Liberty street address is the only residence which is being used as a polling place among the wards.

The voting will begin at 8:00 a.m. and close at 8:00 p.m., Friday will be a legal holiday for county and state offices.

In Jackson county the Democrats are represented by J. P. Graham and Mrs. Marie Myers Bosworth, candidates for state representative. C. L. Hockersmith is running for county commissioner, and Ralph E. Sweeney for county treasurer.

Only in the Republican ranks is there conflict. O. H. Bengtson and W. H. Fluhrer are seeking the nomination for state senator. E. H. Mann, Frank J. Van Dyke, and Ben Day are three who are seeking to fill two posts as state representative candidates. Four men are out to get the one county commissioner nomination, they are: Lloyd G. "Shy" Morthland, A. E. Powell, Chester H. Wendt, and M. A. Adams.

C. A. Myers, incumbent county assessor, is being opposed by John H. Tizekker.

Carlos Moriz and Frank Perl are out to win the nomination for county clerk and George W. Neilson is unopposed for District attorney.

Harlan H. Barrows To Speak June 8

Harlan H. Barrows of Chicago, nationally known consultant on development problems, will direct the public hearing which the Bureau of Reclamation will hold in Medford, Oregon, on June 8, 1948, to determine local sentiment concerning proposed development of water resources of the Rogue River Basin, R. J. Newell, Regional Director, announced today.

Barrows will also analyze the testimony presented at the hearing and then prepare a report recommending a course of action to be followed with respect to the Rogue River development. The hearing will be held in the Armory Building in Medford, beginning at 10:00 a.m. on June 8, and continuing on June 9, if required.

The Bureau will seek to learn the feelings of people of the Rogue River Valley concerning the development of new irrigation, the provision of supplemental water, the development of power generation facilities, the provision of flood control, the development of domestic water supplies and the effects of the potential developments on fishery resources. Information is also desired concerning the cooperation of local interests in such development under reclamation laws.
