Dr. Walter Weller continued to lead the poll in the race for Mayor according to the results of the McLean poll which were taken this week.

The majority of people polled have not as yet made up their minds. Thirty-six per cent of the people are undecided as to just which candidate will get their support when election day finally rolls around.

Mayor Thornton S. Wiley, the present incumbent showed a gain in strength. Wiley, who two weeks ago ran only 12%, this week showed up on the tally sheet with 20%, a gain of 80% in strength.

Colonel Preston B. Waterbury and Colonel Harold Jordan tied for last place in this week's poll, each with 2%.

The free site overlooks the valley and is 338 by 150 feet, making a total of 50,000 square feet available for the building and grounds.
