It is also used for the support of a county health officer, and for hospitalization and treatment of tubercular patients.

## Jackson County Growth Continues

Some indication of recent business and population developments in Oregon counties is seen in figures showing 1948 increases in motor vehicle registrations reported by Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry.

Jackson county ranks sixth in registrations and shows a gain of 16 percent over last year. All counties increased their figure but the amounts varied widely, Newbry pointed out. Gilliam county, ranking in thirty-fifth place in number of vehicles, reported the lowest rate of increase at 6.6 percent.

The report revealed no change in the make-up of the ten leading counties, although Linn moved up a notch to displace Klamath in seventh spot, and Douglas replaced Umatilla in ninth position. The leaders in order are: Multnomah, Lane, Marion, Clackamas, Jackson, Washington, Linn, Klamath, Douglas, and Umatilla.

Top ten counties by percentage gains, however, are Jefferson, Douglas, Wheeler, Harney, Linn, Grant, Lane, Coos, Malheur, and Benton. Multnomah county, with one-third the total state registration, shows an 8.6 per cent climb.
