

Roberts, OSC horticulturist, will report on favorable progress made thus far in woodwaste experimental work at the annual meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural society meeting in Corvallis November 17 and 18. Tests made at the college indicate sawdust is the best mulch material for blueberries, and it looks promising for use on strawberries and other small fruit

The OSC horticulturist is one of a number of speakers who will take part in the horticultursociety's two-day meeting which has been arranged this year for both vegetable crop growers as well as tree fruit producers.



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
