## Highway Post Office Will Be Established

Privately owned and operated highway post office service will be inaugurated between Portland and Corvallis, Oregon, on January 10, according to an announcement today by E. E. Vail, postmaster. This will be the first such service in the northwest.

Special first-trip cachets will be provided for each of the above named cities. Trip 1 will be the initial trip from Portland to Corvallis; Trip 2 will be the initial trip from Corvallis to Portland. Collectors desiring first-trip cancellations should send their covers properly prepared, with postage prepaid and ready for mailing, to the Postmaster, Portland, for Trip 1 cancellations, and to the postmaster, Corvallis, for trip 2 cancellations. A clear space not less than 2 1/2 by 2 1/2 inches to the left on the address side of all covers must be left for application of the cachet.

Covers for first-trip cancellations should be sent under cover or wrapper to the appropriate postmaster with accompanying letter, or endorsement on paper, authorizing the holding of the covers for the first trip and requesting application of the ca-

## POLIO STRIKES TWICE AS MANY DURING 1948 AS COMPARED TO 1947

Tentative year-end figures made public today by Vern Smith, 1949 Jackson county March of Dimes chairman, indicated that Oregon recorded twice as many infantile paralysis cases in 1948 as in 1947. A 1948 total of 220 cases was pointed to in Smith's report which was released as labor, agriculture and veterans organizations prepared for all-out participation in the anti-polio campaign set for January 14-31. The 220 total—compared with 110 cases in 1947—will not be final, it was explained, until complete counts have been received from all of the state's 36 counties, the last of which are expected to report by the middle of January. At least eight counties are known to have experienced infantile paralysis of epidemic incidence during the year, and several have had to turn to the now-depleted epidemic aid fund of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for financial assistance.

Dr. E. T. Hedlund of Portland, state March of Dimes chairman, informed the Jackson county campaign organization today that the American Legion, state grange and state AFL and CIO have volunteered what he termed "major support." State grange Master Morton Tompkins has written all local and Pomona grange officials, urging their organizations and their individual members to give "this emergency

aid." No provision will be made for point to point covers; however, at the request of collectors covers receiving cachets will be directed to the outer terminus of the trip, and will then be back stamped and dispatched onward to destination.

All covers intended for first-trip cancellation should be in the hands of the appropriate postmasters at an early date, and not later than January 8, 1949.

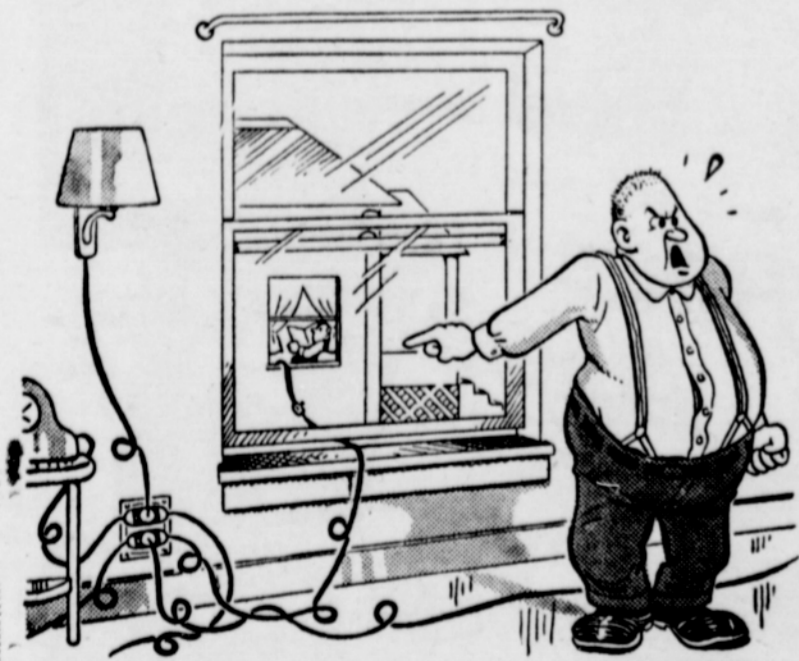
