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Mrs. Nye To Head  
Easter Sale Drive

Jackson county's chairman for the annual Easter Seal sale by the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults will be Mrs. Stephen Nye, Jr. of Medford, according to an announcement received from Jesse Rosenbaum of LaGrande, society president.

Rosenbaum said the sale, the third sponsored by the Society in Oregon, will be held from March 20 through Easter Sunday. Approximately 400,000 residents of the state will receive Easter Seals through the mail, he stated.

"There are thousands of crippled children and adults in Oregon who need the help from Easter Seals because they are not eligible for assistance from any other agency, public or private," Rosenbaum said. "The society does not duplicate the services of any other group."

The society is not interested in whether a child or adult's condition is the result of an accident or any one of more than 200 crippling diseases, but only in whether the person needs assistance and cannot obtain it, the president reported.

Two Dead After  
Shooting AffrayKILLER MURDERS MAN  
THEN TAKES OWN LIFE

Talent, Feb. 24 — One man murdered and another man committed suicide and a third narrowly escaped death in a shooting which took place at 9:30 on Wednesday morning on the Schuette ranch on Anderson creek.

The murdered man was John Schuette, 71, long time resident of Southern Oregon, who was killed by Robert Wilburn Hickman, 62, woodcutter for John and Herman Schuette. Herman Schuette escaped death by running from Hickman who went amok after killing John and took off up the hill to get Herman. Unable to kill Herman, Hickman turned the 25-35 calibre rifle on himself and committed suicide.

No reason for the shooting could be found other than the fact that Hickman had been dependent during the past week and had talked about suicide. Hickman was a recluse, neighbors said.

Early Wednesday morning John Schuette had gone down to Hickman's place, a quarter of a mile down the road, as he was going to town and wanted to see if Hickman needed any groceries.

Soon after John had left, Herman heard two shots and stepped outside to investigate. At that moment Hickman appeared and shot at Herman who lit out for tall timber. Hickman, unable to get Herman turned the gun on himself.

Hickman has a family in St. Joseph, Missouri. His body is at Conger-Morris funeral home. Schuette's body is at Perl funeral home.

The ranch where the killings took place is two miles north of the main Anderson creek road and because of the condition of the road it was 3:30 in the afternoon before the bodies were brought down.

Control methods for both diseases and insects are included in the mimeographed circular which contains a spray schedule starting with a dormant spray when winter buds are about to open and ends with sprays to control fruit fly and cherry slugs.

Ashland cherry growers who wish to get the spray information bulletin can receive it by writing to the Oregon state college extension service.
