Recall Election Set For St. Pat's Day

Members of the Ashland city council, in a meeting Wednesday afternoon passed a resolution, providing for either compromise appointments in case of recall on any concilman next St. Patrick's day or in case no decision can be reached between the mayor and the council, in fifteen days the matter of filling any vacancies which occur would be turned over to the people.

The people would then vote on a charter amendment permitting election to fill vacancies caused by recall, and if this amendment were passed the people would then vote on candidates to fill the vacancies.

The recall election has been set for March 17. It will determine whether or not councilmen, John Nosler, Herb Fischborn and John Daugherty should be recalled.

The decision to pass the resolution was brought about by the action of the Civic Betterment League which Tuesday night presented a group of petitions to the council requesting an amendment to the charter which would provide for election of recalled officials. The petitions were incorrectly prepared and were not acceptable but through their attorney, Ed Kelly, the League requested that the council use their powers and present such an amendment to the people.

Nosler, speaking for himself at the Wednesday afternoon session, stated that he felt the proposed amendment was a fair one, "if I am recalled," he said. "I feel that the people should have a chance to elect some one to take my place."

Under existing laws the remaining members of the council have the right to elect men to fill the vacancies which may be brought about in case any of the three under fire were recalled.

The resolution reads: Action on submitting a charter amendment through action of the council be tabled but in lieu thereof it be declared that if the recall election is successful in any particular the remaining councilmen and the mayor must unanimously agree on filling vacancies. If unable to unanimously agree within a period of fifteen days then a charter amendment to permit the people to elect councilmen to fill vacancies should be submitted to the people; in other words, no vacancy in office of councilman shall be filled except by unanimous agreement of the mayor and councilmen or by the people.
