IN CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF JACKSON, W. O. MARTIN and DELTA C. MARTIN, husband and wife, Plaintiffs

vs.

F. H. MANN and LOUISE MANN, husband and wife, each and all the unknown heirs of F. H. Mann and Louise Mann, if deceased, and also any and all other persons or parties unknown, claiming any right, title, lien, claim, estate or interest in and to the real property described in the Complaint herein, Defendants.

TO: Each, every and all of the above named Defendants:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON you and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the Complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the first day of four weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons, and if you fail to appear and answer said Complaint, for want thereof, the Plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in their Complaint, succinctly stated as follows, to-wit:

That a Decree be entered adjudicating any and all right, title, estate, lien or claim which you or any of you have or claim to have in, to or upon the real property situated in Jackson County, Oregon, particularly described as follows, to-wit:

The East Half of the Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter (E $\frac{1}{2}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$ ), and the East Half of the Northeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (E $\frac{1}{2}$ NE $\frac{1}{4}$ SW $\frac{1}{4}$ ) all in Section 23, Township 39 South, Range 1 East of the W. M., Jackson County, Oregon, particularly described as follows, to-wit:

ALSO, Beginning at the Northeast corner of the East Half of the Southeast Quarter of Section 23, Township 39 South, Range 1 East of the W. M., Jackson County, Oregon, run thence East 5.50 chains; thence South 71 degrees West 0.64 chains; thence South 29 1/2 degrees West 4.70 chains; thence South 41 degrees West 5.50 chains; thence North 8.52 chains to the point of beginning.

It grew and grew until I finally awakened to the realization that through my failure to prune it back and control its growth, I had allowed it to become a thing of destruction.
