Bad Tolz Gemany, Mar. 25—A young ex-sailor from Ashland, Oregon, arrived at this Bavarian "port" under a full head of steam recently, loaded to the gunwales with a yen for European travel, and thus became the 2000th man to enlist specifically for duty with the 1st Infantry Division.

Recruit Robert E. Myers, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Fox, 347 E. Main Street, Ashland, and a veteran of more than two years war service in the Pacific, ignored a call to further sea duty in order to serve with the Army's oldest division, the world famous "Fighting First."

The twenty-three year old combat veteran completed his change from Navy blue to the khaki-green uniform when he checked in at 1st Division headquarters here located in a former Nazi SS school.

Assigned to the Divisions motor pool at Bad Tolz, Myers will enjoy ample opportunities to fulfill his expressed desire to "see

a bit of Europe with the 1st Division." The headquarters is located in the shadow of the Bavarian Alps, a section known to the world over for its unlimited recreation and sports facilities. With in easy travel distance are Garmisch, scene of the 1936 Winter Olympic games; St. Moritz and its neighboring ski slopes; Munich and Berchtesgaden with their infamous relics of defeated Nazism.

Fish Released For I. Waltons

Butte Falls hatchery this month released 26,000 yearling silver salmon into the Rogue river system. Cutthroats numbering 66,000 are also being distributed to the Rogue and its tributaries. Near-legal cutthroat will be held at this station for Lake O' Woods until the roads are open.

It is emphasized by the game commission that these legal and near legal fish are stocked to be caught. Plants are made where the greatest return to the angler is anticipated. The fish are being held in the hatcheries, as long as possible, until optimum food and water conditions in the streams and lakes exist. Mrs. Day Explains Need for Funds

Mrs. John S. Day, Jackson county chairman for the current campaign of the American Cancer Society, was advised today that the society allocated \$3,200,000 to various cancer research projects throughout the United States in 1948.

Mrs. Day was informed that the research allocations from funds raised by the society in 1948 were completed recently when 205 applications for grants-in-aid and 45 applications for fellowships were approved.

Details of the grants-in-aid have not been publicly announced as yet, Mrs. Day said, but indications are that some Oregon scientists will participate. There are several promising research projects under way in Oregon and it is reasonable to believe they will receive help from the society, Mrs. Day stated.

It was pointed out that the society's funds for research were so limited it was possible to supply only 44 cents for every dollar requested by the scientists in 1948.

Oregon's quota in the society's campaign this month is \$130,145, and Jackson county has been asked to raise \$3,292.67.
