The idle person is no better than a dead one and takes up more room. "Get rich and retire," says the big insurance advertisements... "\$200 a month at age 60 for life... rest and vacation... no more worries." Bah! Money and time are the heaviest burdens of life and the unhappiest of mortals are those who have more of either than they know how to use.

Every man should live like a poor man, regardless of the fact that he has money. Nature knows nothing of bank balances. In order to have an appetite for dinner, you must earn your dinner. If you would sleep at night, you must first pay for sweet repose by physical labor. The reward for work is not immunity from toil, but more work and increased capacity for more work. Work is man's greatest satisfaction. He is nothing, he can achieve nothing, fulfill nothing, without working.

Debauchery, riot, splendor, luxury are attempts to get pleasure out of life that is not our due, and so nature provides her penalty for the idle and gluttonous. The greatest idler is not he who does nothing, but he who withholds from society the fullest use of his talents. If you are poor, work; if you are rich, continue working. If you are burdened with seemingly unfair responsibilities, work. If you are happy, keep right on working. Idleness gives room for doubts and fears.

How much easier our work would be if we put forth as much energy trying to improve the quality of it, as most of us do trying to find excuses for not properly attending to it. If disappointments come, work. If your health is threatened, work. Work as if your life is really in peril. It really is. Work never hurt anybody.

I congratulate poor young men and women being born to that ancient and honorable fraternity which renders it necessary that they should devote themselves to work. Idleness is the burial of a living man. Work faithfully. Work with faith. Work is the greatest remedy available for both mental and physical afflictions. Your share of work may be limited, but the fact that it is work makes it precious.

Darwin could only work for half an hour at a time, yet in many diligent half hours he opened up new fields of science. When men are rightly occupied, their amusement grows out of their work. When men know that their work is helping society, all of their emotions are steady, deep and rhythmic, as is the natural pulse of the body. Do your work, not just your work and no more, but a little more for good measure; that little more which is worth all the rest. Put your heart into it and the sky will clear. Then out of your doubts and suffering will be born the supreme joy of life.

There are people who do not work, but the world is not proud of them. It doesn't even know their names. The great busy world doesn't know they are here. Take off your coat and make the dust fly. The busier you are, the less trouble you are likely to get into, the sweeter will be your sleep, the brighter your holidays, and the better satisfied the whole world will be with you.

WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

The following editorial was written by Bob Stumbo, editor of the Siskiyou, Southern Oregon college's student weekly. We are reprinting it in the belief that any type of spurring would be a help to the State Board of Higher Education in determining what growth should take place at Southern Oregon College.

In last week's assembly the students and faculty of SOC heard an Army day address. That which aroused interest was the fact that the speaker was Mr. Edgar Smith, head of the State Board of Higher Education. It was not in anticipation of hearing a rousing flag-waving oration that students crowded the auditorium to capacity, it was because it had been rumored that Mr. Smith was to say something of vital importance concerning Southern Oregon college and its struggle for independence. We were disappointed. Mr. Smith mentioned rather hurriedly, that he was acutely aware of conditions facing us "here in Southern Oregon" and that something would be done.

If we seem a trifle ungrateful to Mr. Smith for this verbal offering, perhaps we should explain that we are not new to such vagueries, and we point rather cynically to the late Governor Hall and the "not so late" representative Ellsworth, both of whom have given us verbal aid.

Never before in its history, has this college needed more desperately a helping hand from those who are in power up state. If our cries for equality and independence are not heeded, the battle which we have waged so grimly throughout the past years, will have been in vain. This college is at that point in its maturation where it must either expand and become a four-year college, with full rights and privileges, or to ling-

on and eventually wither and die.

It is of paramount importance that something be done before it is too late! Students can not be held with pretty promises that can be shattered by the whims of Salem politicians. Months ago we were promised a new library. "The next session of the Legislature" was the stock phrase. Age, has made the phrase unbearable. Where is our new library? According to the latest report; Funds, (and I quote), "will be appropriated." Now is the time that it is needed, not next year or within the next ten years!

At present, SOC's library contains approximately 20,000 volumes. It should contain 60,000! The fund which is ironically called the "Library fund," is surpassed in cost by the book requirements of one professor alone.

Faced with the problems of inadequate facilities, and the fact that SOC has no hope of becoming more than a two year institution, the pick of our students go elsewhere.

Yes, Mr. Smith delivered a very impassioned speech about liberty and equality for the people of the United States but not a word about liberty and equality for SOC. He mentioned the Marshall Plan and financial support for the politically down trodden of Europe, but not a word of the politically down trodden "bastard" of the state educational system.

In all fairness to Mr. Smith, his speech on "Army Day," was good; as to his sincerity in helping SOC, the next session of the Legislature will tell—

Oregon Hereford Breeders Organize

Announcement has been made of the organization of the Oregon Hereford Breeders Association, by Si Williams, Flourence Rock ranch Prospect, president of the new association. The organization is made up of Hereford cattle breeders throughout the entire state and was begun by a number of farsighted breeders, in the interest of promoting better Hereford breeding in Oregon to result in higher placing of Oregon Hereford stock throughout the country.

Preliminary meeting of the breeders was held in Eugene, on January 23, when temporary officers and directors were appointed. At the recent Northwest Hereford Association show in Spokane, Washington, attended by Hereford breeders representative of every section in Oregon, the temporary officers, directors and others held a meeting and election of officers for their association.

Jack Turner, Kansas City, Mo., secretary of the American Hereford Association, met with the men in Spokane, giving aid in the organization of the new association. The first officers are: president, Si Williams, Flourence Rock Ranch, Prospect; secretary-treasurer, Ralph Cook, Medford; directors, Herbert Chandler, Baker; O. D. Hotchkiss, Burns; Norman Jacob, Prineville; Ted Ball, Grass Valley; Lawrence Horton, Klamath Falls; Walter Hubbard, Junction City; Associate director, Dr. Fred McKenzie, Corvallis. These men will serve for one year or until the next annual meeting of the association's members.

Commercial operators will be invited to join either as associate or regular members, as desired by the operator.

Plans for the first Oregon Hereford Association show and sale in 1950, will soon be formulated.

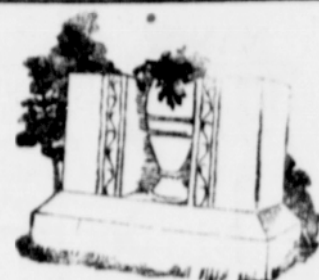
