MASON MISSES COUNCIL MEETING WHERE PLAN RUNS INTO A SNAG

G. D. Mason, mausoleum builder, failed to appear at the Tuesday council meeting to petition the city council for permission to place to wings on each end of the Mountain View Mausoleum.

The following letter concerning the proposal was read by Mayor Tom Williams at the Tuesday meeting: "We, the undersigned, Directors of the Ashland Mt. View Mausoleum, wish to register our protest against the proposed addition to the Mt. View Mausoleum, for the following reasons:

(1) We have never been consulted or contacted with reference to the proposal.

(2) The city of Ashland does not own the Mt View Mausoleum or have any control over it.

(3) It is our belief that the new mausoleum being built in the north end of Mt View Cemetery will entirely fill the need for mausoleum space, at prices which are not excessive—in fact, much less than many of our crypt owners have paid.

(4) We have no intention of permitting the use of our present walls in order to reduce costs of a new addition"

DR. KOO TO SPEAK HERE

A speaker of world prominence, Dr. T. Z. Koo, secretary of the World Student Christian Federation, will appear in Ashland Friday. During the day Dr. Koo will speak at Southern Oregon college and at the senior high school, and he will speak that evening at 7:30 at the First Methodist church.

Topic for the evening meeting will be "The International Situation in the Far East." The public is invited.

Dr. Koo served as advisor to the San Francisco United Nations conference in 1945. In 1944 he was in China, where he made a trip through occupied China to Chungking, during the trip he was disguised as a peddler.

Dr. Koo has been appearing before college and university assemblies of the Pacific coast during the past several weeks and is scheduled to speak to a Southern Oregon college assembly in the near future. During the fall he will serve as guest lecturer in the school of religion at the University of California.

COUNCIL HIRES DAY AS STREET COMMISSIONER

Long Session Tuesday Night Brings Results

All members of the city council with Mayor Williams and city attorney Harry Skerry, Jr., and City Recorder J. B. Austin, met in the council chamber Tuesday evening. Minutes of the previous meeting were read by Austin and approved.

Austin then presented bills for the past month for the approval of the six councilmen. Harold Merrill asked if this amount included the bill to the News Review for printing of the News Review. Merrill stated that if the News Review made the statement that he did not wish to approve the bill at this time. Stansbury also stated that he did not wish to approve the News Review bill, as it was decided to vote on this bill separately. Stansbury and Merrill voted "no" with the remaining councilmen voting "yes." Other bills were okayed.

City recorder read a letter from the directors of the Chamber of Commerce asking for \$2500.00 for advertising and betterment of the Chamber to be included in this year's budget. The council went on record as approving this amount of money for the Chamber but thought it should be referred to the budget committee.

Letter was then read from the Realty Board asking that this area not be under rent control. The council voted that this be approved.

It was agreed by all council members that the remainder of \$3,826.00 for the parking meters be paid out of the \$6321, that is in the parking meter fund.

Communication from Owen Gragg of Twin Plunges was discussed, concerning the dirt from the nearby sawmill that falls in the pools. Homes, Kroeger and Stansbury were appointed to investigate this situation. Bernard Pederson also spoke from the floor, stating the situation that existed on Weightman street as to the sawmills.

Licenses were granted to the Warner Bros. and Clyde Beatty circus companies to show in Ashland.

Steve Zarka wrote the city offering his filling station for sale to them at \$57,000 to be used as a fire station. This was not considered inasmuch as the building now occupied by Herbert's Fruit Co. is being considered.

Other business such as changing the street name off Highway 66 to Ashland street and a report from the realty committee by Merrill was discussed.

Report signed by five councilmen of the Resthaven Mausoleum was read and accepted.

Stansbury gave a report of Summer strip airport. He stated that the cost of putting the granite on this strip would be \$600.00.

A contract will be signed with Sumner Parker to be in effect for 9 1/2 years, with the condition that facilities of the airport be open to private fliers and that gasoline service and telephone facilities be provided. Merrill made the motion that the contract be approved.

Greyhound Depot Moves To Hotel

Greyhound bus lines this week began operating out of their new depot in the Ashland hotel building. Fred W. Kiel, operator of the Ashland Hotel coffee shop is the local agent.

Buses will continue to stop at the regular place on North Pioneer.

Kiel is remodeling and making baggage and ticket counter arrangements in the coffee shop in order to handle the bus passengers.

The Greyhound tavern had been a Greyhound station since 1928. Prior to that time the station was in the Ashland hotel and the bus line was known as the Oregon stages.

In Ashland this week making arrangements for the move to the new location were L. E. Shipley, district traffic manager, B. W. Coldeaway, superintendent and R. E. Hutchinson, district passenger agent.
