

"Dog Day" Take Place Here May 29 Kennel Club Shows

"Dog Day" will take place in Ashland Sunday, May 29, when the Southern Oregon Kennel Club, Inc. presents their first annual All Breed Dog Show at Walter Phillips field.

It will be a one day unbenched show, approved by the American Kennel club. Five hundred people are expected to attend and bring an unspecified number of cocker spaniels, pointers, English setters, chihuahuas, pomeranians, pekingese, toy poodles, toy manchesters, Yorkshire terriers, hounds, dachshunds, boxers, Collies, Doberman pinschers, German shepherds, Great Danes, Shetland sheep dogs, fox terriers, scottish terriers, Boston terriers, Bulldogs and other breeds.

Other dogs to be in town that day include griffons, retrievers, weimaraners, borzois, basenjis. Among the hounds will be basset hounds, beagles, bloodhounds, afghan hounds, coon hounds, deerhounds, foxhounds, greyhounds, Norwegian elkhounds, otterhound, and wolfhounds.

Harriers, Salukis, whippets, malamutes briards and askimos are invited to the show.

Dogs with names and pedigree which might appear include briards, Komondors, Kuvaskok, puliks, rottweilers, samoyeds, Welsh corgis, schauzers, Lhasa apso, keeshonden, and schipperkes.

Judging will begin at 9:00 a.m. and the show will continue throughout the day until 6:00 p.m. Entry fees are as follows: first class, \$4.00; each additional class, \$1.00. Brace class, \$1.00. Dogs not registered in the American Kennel club Stud books must be listed, the listing fee is 25c. Entries must be sent to Betty Lee Boyle, Rt. 1, Box 388, Medford, Oregon, and checks must accompany the entry blank.

First prize will be a blue ribbon, third prize a yellow ribbon, fourth prize a purple ribbon. Best of winners will get a blue and white ribbon, reserve winners will get a purple and white ribbon, best of breed will get a purple and gold ribbon, best of opposite sex to best of breed will get a red and white ribbon.

Ribbon prizes for non regular classes are: first prize, rose ribbon, second prize, brown ribbon, third prize, light green ribbon, and fourth prize, gray ribbon.

One hundred and twentyone trophies are to be awarded to owners of dogs in the various classifications. In addition to the trophies, a total of 28 other prizes are being offered.

No Chains Needed For Crater Lake

Salem, Ore., May 12—A heavy snow pack is expected to delay the opening this year of the rim drive around Crater Lake and the opening of the east and north entrances, the Oregon state highway commission travel information department was informed this week by national park service offices at Medford.

However, the west and south entrances to the park and on up to the rim are now in excellent condition, with no ice or snow on the pavement. Snow depths are now gradually decreasing up to eight inches in a day, with indications that Annie Spring campground at the junction of the south and west roads will be in use much earlier than the rim campground. The latter is more than 1000 feet higher with the snow accordingly deeper.

Lodge accommodations are scheduled to be available June 15 when sleeping cabins also are to be opened for the season. The rim campground will not be ready. Annie Spring is expected to be open at that time and will serve camping needs, park officials said. Bus service is to begin from Medford, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls June 15.

Need Certificates To Move Animals

(Editor's note: This is the second of three articles prepared by the state department of agriculture on the new livestock brand inspection law, now effective.)

Every owner of cattle and horses in Oregon should become familiar with operation of the new livestock brand inspection law, and as rapidly as possible representatives of the state department of agriculture's division of animal industry will meet with livestock groups to explain details and answer questions. The law applies also to mules and asses.

Under the new law, some form of certificate is required on all livestock movement, whether the animals are being moved to a point within the state or outside Oregon. Here is a brief explanation of inspection requirements:

1. If the animals are being moved out of Oregon, they must be inspected before leaving the state and a brand inspection certificate must accompany them. If no inspector is available at point of origin, movement may be made on a transportation certificate to the nearest inspector, where this certificate is exchanged upon inspection for the brand inspection certificate.

Should movement out-of-state be a continuous trip for reentry into Oregon in a normal ranch operation and without unloading or change in ownership inspection fees will be refunded if claim is made within 30 days on affidavit provided by the department.

2. If the livestock movement is within the state to a range outside Oregon, brand inspection is required before the animals leave the state. If the same animals are returned within eight months, one-half the inspection fees will be refunded if application is made within 30 days of return of the stock. The refund application must be accompanied by the Oregon certificate of brand inspection made when stock left the state and also certificate, if any, issued by other states upon reentry into Oregon.

3. If the movement be to a slaughterhouse, packer, stockyard, livestock auction market or any market agency within the state, brand inspection is required at destination if not performed at point of origin. Movement to any

of these points may be on a transportation certificate.

Animals moved from any of these places or agencies to a slaughterhouse in Oregon or outside may be moved on a duplicate brand inspection certificate, issued free. Other livestock movement from these places requires a transportation certificate signed by owner or his agent.

4. In short, all livestock moved in any manner to any place must be accompanied by a brand inspection certificate or a transportation certificate, with these exceptions: if the movement is in course of regular ranch operations and on hoof within the state; or if the movement is of horses for handling, herding, or trailing livestock or for racing, showing, displaying or exhibiting within the state none is required. However, any person moving horses for purposes just outlined must have in his or her possession evidence of ownership or right of possession.

When change of ownership is involved in livestock movement, a bill of sale must accompany the animals. A bill of sale form will be made a part of the new transportation certificate.
