Forest Service Starts Fee Service For Use of Campgrounds; Two in Oregon

Twelve of the more than 1,100 national forest campgrounds in Oregon and Washington will be placed on a charge basis this summer, according to an announcement just made by regional forester H. J. This action is following through with the policy announced last January, when it was stated that charges would be made for the use of certain national forest campgrounds. Oregon national forests affected are the following: Mt. Hood at Camp Creek and Tollgate; Rogue River at McKee Bridge and Dead Indian Soda Springs; Siuslaw at Eel creek and Siltcoos; Umpqua at Wolf creek: Willamette at Clear and Paradise.

Operation of some of these camps will be by permittees who will be allowed to collect fees for the use of the facilities in return for providing their services in keeping the areas clean, disposing of garbage, maintaining the improvements, and furnishing firewood. At least four charge areas will be operated by forest service attendants, who will provide the same standards of maintenance and services as at permitee-operated areas.

Charges for the use of the selected camp grounds will be: Camping, 50 cents per night or \$3.00 per week per car of not not more than six adults. No ministering forest recreational fa- under 12 years of age for either camping or picnicking.
