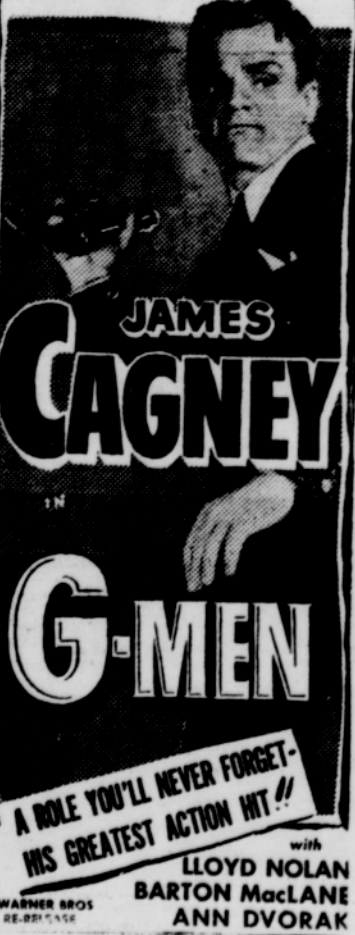

Mrs. Ogilvie, who died here Sunday, was the daughter of one of Ashland's oldest pioneer families. Her father, Robert R. Hargadine came from Delaware in 1854 and opened the first general store on the present site of the Ashland Hotel. Her husband, Alexander G., died in 1940.

Fair Entries Set Record

Livestock entries closed last week at the headquarters of the Oregon State Fair in Salem with a record number of purebreds entered in most classifications.

Manager Leo Spitzbart expects nearly 5,000 animals to be on hand when the fair opens Labor day. Competition will be particularly keen in all beef and dairy cattle classes.

Meanwhile, the 167 acres of fairgrounds are being touched up in preparation for the state's biggest outdoor show. The last major bit of construction for the 1949 exposition, a "kiddieland" amusement area, is about completed. The 77 acres of parking area have been completely disced and leveled.

Demand for commercial display space is reported to be the heaviest in the history. The farm machinery area alone will occupy two of the eight blocks on the fair's main midway.

Helene Hughes, veteran San Francisco theatrical producer, has assured Spitzbart the night vaudeville show in front of the racing grandstand will be the finest ever offered at the Salem plant. Miss Hughes has also booked a trio of high wire acts to be the basis of a free midway show four times daily.

Harrison Cutler, horse show manager has been deluged with stall requests for horses entered in the combined horse show-odeo. There will be the combined show six nights of the fair with straight rodeo competition slated for Sunday afternoon, Sept. 11.

Quarter horses, the "farmer's race horse", will participate in the Oregon state fair racing meet at Salem for the first time when the track opens its six day meet on Labor day.

Charles A. Evans, Independence, superintendent, said this week that one quarter horse dash will be staged daily as a part of the ten race cards. There will be no harness races during the 1949 meet.

Evans added a number of Oregon bred races for two and three year olds have been included in the purse list, which is the largest in the fair's history. Opening day feature will be the Labor day Handicap at a mile and one sixteenth for a purse of \$1,000.

German Student To Attend SOC During 1949-50

Harald Stieler, of Nuernberg, Germany, will be the first European student to attend Southern Oregon College through assignment from the Institute of International Education. Confirmation of his scholarship award and permission to leave Germany has been received by Mabel W. Winston, Registrar of Southern Oregon college. He will enter fall term which begins September 22. Mr. Stieler will come to this country on an Army Transport due in New York September 17.

Rated as a class one candidate by the Cultural Exchange Advisory Committee for Bavaria, his activities in Germany since the close of the war included chairmanship of the Eagle Youth club and active participation in the

American Youth club. To learn American methods of education and to study languages is Mr. Stieler's educational objective. While the U. S. Government assists with the expense of travel and some items of incidental expense, the college, the student body of Southern Oregon college, and civic groups of Ashland and Southern Oregon, will assist in meeting registration fees, books, and living expenses. The institution of International Education administers funds for the United States Department of the Army which will meet round trip travel expenses for the students. This arrangement requires the student to return to Germany in 1950.

The American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education meeting recently in St. Louis urged its members to invite 200 German and Austrian teacher-education students for teacher training in the United States. Southern Oregon college and others assisting will be actively participating in the international program for German Teacher

Education through bringing Harald Stieler to spend a year studying education methods in the U. S.
