## Dr. Brown is Featured In AP Science Article

An Associated Press science story in the Sunday Oregon Journal told of a recent study of cracking joints conducted by Dr. Edward E. Brown of Ashland and the report of the study in a medical journal.

The article relates that Dr. Brown, upon becoming interested in what causes the cracking joints, began a study on the matter by trying to crack the joints of his fingers several times a day. Other persons aided in the study by keeping count of their cracking joints.

He found that weather and humidity apparently have a lot to do with the cracking, according to the story. Electrical thunder storms will bring on more snapping of joints, as will cool weather or becoming chilled on a hot day.

The Journal added to the story by mentioning that Dr. Brown was Portland port of embarkation surgeon during the war and had realized his desire

to become an Oregon resident by returning to live in Ashland. Dr. Brown has conducted and reported on several other medical studies, including one on the common cold.

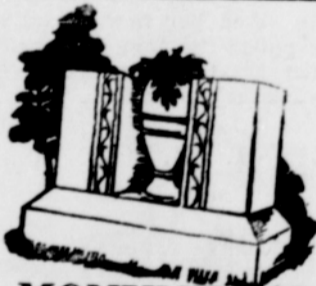
