

Football Predictions . . .

With this issue, the Williamson System starts a new breakdown in its percentages of correct prediction. Henceforth the System is giving figures on "Major" games and all games predicted. Many years' statistics show it is much harder to keep track of smaller four-year colleges and junior colleges than of more prominent teams.

Kentucky attains No. 1 national ranking this week for the first time in the 18-years of the Williamson System. They reached that rank by beating Ole Miss., a good team in any league, 47 to 0. In second place is Army, for overwhelming Penn State, anything but a pushover, 42 to 7. No. 3 is Texas, because Texas beat Idaho 56 to 7. Michigan is No. 4, and the Wolverines are either good again or Stanford is greener than is was supposed to be.

The No. 1 game of the week is Army vs. Michigan. And the Cadets ought to win it, although the game may be close enough to give both coaches heart failure.

It looks as if Army has some of its old power left yet. The Wolverines are busting a gusset defending their national championship. But Army's 42 to 7 victory over Penn State looks more impressive than Michigan's 27 to 7 win over Stanford.

A game that may give Army-Michigan some competition for the No. 1 attraction is Texas versus Oklahoma at Dallas. Texas ought to win, but it will be a game between two thundering giants.
