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Junior Chamber President Visits Polio Patient; Iron Lung Fund Needs Help

While down in the bay area last weekend for the University of Oregon — University of California football game, Mr. and Mrs. Ken Jones stopped at the Permanente hospital to call on Mrs. Marian McMillan who is a Polio patient.

Mrs. McMillan, an attractive 28 year old mother, contacted polio in June of this year. Her first symptoms of a sore throat, aching muscles, a fever, and a bad headache, caused her to visit a doctor, thinking possibly that she might have influenza. Shortly hereafter she was admitted to the Permanente hospital and tests revealed Polio. The Paralysis first struck her arms and then one leg. Although she did not show symptoms of the dreaded Bulbar Polio (which paralyzes the throat) an Emerson Iron Lung was placed outside of her hospital room. Paralysis did strike her lungs and within a few minutes she was gasping for air. By the time she was placed in the lung and artificial respiration was begun she was near death from lack of oxygen.

Mr. Jones quoted Mrs. McMillan as saying "The first time I was taken out of the lung I began gasping for air immediately and remained out for only 18 seconds. Now I am able to go all day long without the help of the respirator, which I now use only at night. Every day I gain a little strength, am able to wiggle my fingers and move my legs. I hope to be able to go home by Christmas and within a year I do not expect to have any crippling deformity."

When asked what she thought of an iron lung Mrs. McMillan stated "It saved my life. I am shocked that you do not have one in Jackson County. Had I been living there last June I wouldn't be alive today. If it will help your drive, tell my story to the people of Ashland, and Jackson County. Tell them I know how fast a lung is needed when Polio strikes. Once the paralysis begins there isn't time to be flown to Eugene or Portland."

When asked how the drive was coming, Mr. Jones stated the goal was in sight, but that an untold amount of hard work had been placed upon the shoulders of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the club sponsoring the drive, and of which he is President.
