Lydia Frances Powers

Lydia Frances Powers, 87, a resident of Talent of the Wagner Creek road, passed away at her home Friday night after a long illness.

Mrs. Powers was born Lydia Chase on April 16, 1862, in Portage, Wisc. Her father David Chase was a government surveyor and was ordered to the Nebraska frontier in 1873. He located at Plattsburgh, and then York, where Mrs. Powers was graduated and then taught school. The family then moved to Ridfield, S. D. where she taught for seven years in the Great Bend school until her marriage to Ned Powers of Oakland, Calif.

The family came to Talent in 1908, buying an orchard, and later locating at the present home on Wagner Creek road in 1927. Mr. Powers preceded his wife in death in 1942.

A daughter Eleanor survives, and an adopted daughter, Mrs. Everett Bailey both of Talent. A son Orlean died in 1918 at Ft. McDowell, California.

Services were held Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 in the Litwiller Funeral Home, with the Rev. Alice Wooley of the Talent Methodist Church officiating. Interment followed in Stearns cemetery.

William J. Montgomery

William J. Montgomery, 83, a resident of Ashland for over 20 years, passed away Thursday afternoon at 193 High St. after a year's illness.

He was born on March 14, 1866, near New Castle, Pa.; on May 13, 1891 was married to Ida May Winton at Butler, Pa. A daughter, Ethel, died in early childhood and a son, Charles, died at sea during World War I. He and his wife celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary at their home on Scenic Drive in 1941. His wife preceded him in death in November 1947.

They lived in California and No. Dakota, where they farmed prior to coming to Ashland. While here he was a carpenter. In the spring of 1948 he flew back to the scenes of his boy-

hood and visited his niece and nephew in New Castle, his wife's sisters in Pennsylvania, and a niece in Warren, Ohio. He was the last of his immediate family. His seat in the 1st Presbyterian church is vacant and a host of friends will miss him.

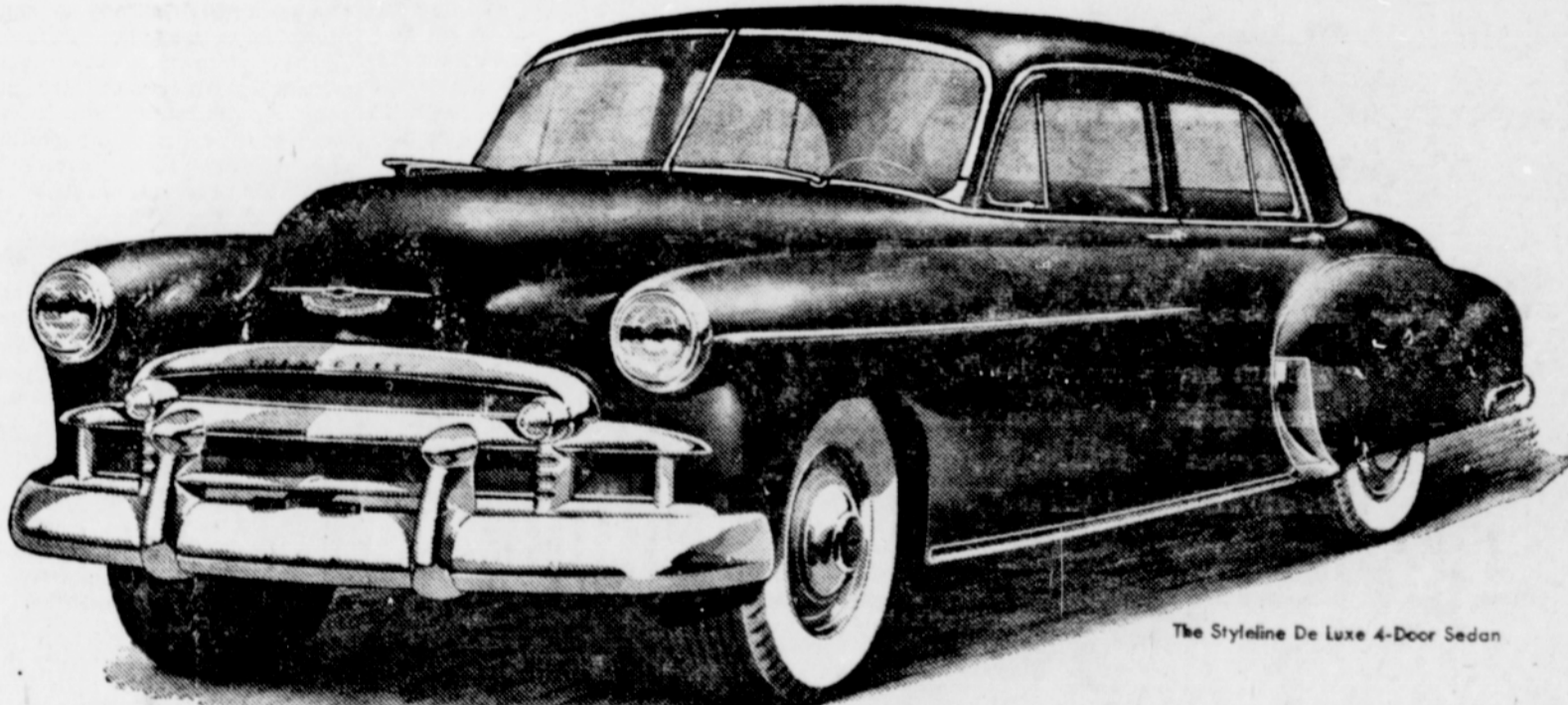
