## Kiwanians Hear Dr. Crandall

Members of the local Kiwanis club heard Dr. W. J. Crandall, first secretary of the original Ashland club and past Kiwanis Lt. Governor speak briefly at their regular noon luncheon on Monday. Dr. Crandall pointed out the socialistic trends of government and the similarity between socialism and communism. He observed that the Federal government is currently engaged in a deficit spending program, that more than 3300 persons are currently employed in propaganda bureaus and that the state of New York is now paying ten times more to the government today than it did ten years ago. He urged Kiwanians to read both sides of every issue before making any decision which might increase and further the trend toward socialism. Dr. Crandall concluded by saying that any country, to survive, must be strong spiritually, physically and economically.

As chairman of the Education and Fellowship committee, Harry Skerry Jr. introduced Secretary-Treasurer, John Schulz, who paid tribute to past president, Bert Miller, for his outstanding work as head of the organization during 1949. On behalf of the club, Schulz presented Miller with a card and gift from the club. Miller spoke briefly and thanked members for their support. He complimented both Barnett and Schulz for their splendid work and cooperation during 1949.

Skerry next introduced Dr. Elmo Stevenson of Southern Oregon College, who noted that the college now has an enrollment exceeding 750 students — a 14% increase over the last winter's enrollment. He stated that April 1st is the tentative date set for breaking ground at the Library site, provided approval is received from the state.

President Barnett announced that the director for the 1950 "Kiwanis Kapers" would arrive February 5th. The "Kapers" are scheduled to open February 20th. Both Medford and Ashland Kiwanians will participate in the show. Barnett called the attention of members to the article on the Kiwanis Boys' Boxing Club and 3 photos appearing in the current issue of the Kiwanis International magazine.
