

Sure Proof Of Communism Alarms Audience

Monday evening a number of local people attended the lecture given in Medford by Col. William Browne of Portland. Col. Browne who now holds the position of chief of Detectives of the Portland Police department, spoke to an attentive audience on the organizational functioning of the world wide communist movement as applied to this country.

Using the textbooks and factual material of the Communist Party the speaker traced the entire revolutionary program through its progressive stages of training, infiltration, strikes, riots and ultimate "take-over." He quoted verbatim orders for sabotage in time of war and for the "turning of imperialist war into civil war." He told of the actual training of children in local communist schools and camps; of the use of unsuspecting "liberals;" and of the respectable churches and clubs which are chosen as "fronts" for the promotion of communism in the United States.

Following his address Col. Browne showed a film illustrating his points and concluded with an open question period. The speaker not only represents the Police department of Portland but is the head of the Sub-

versive Activities committee of the American Legion in Oregon. He served in the U.S. army in both World Wars and has spent much time on active duty in Europe and Asia. He was an eye witness to the Communist revolution in 1919 in Russia and has seen the development of encroaching communism in eastern Germany following the recent war.

Little Symphony Receives Plaudits Of Ashland Crowd

The Southern Oregon Little Symphony Orchestra presented its winter concert last Monday night in Churchill Hall before an enthusiastic audience. The program opened with Beethoven's Fifth Symphony, which was very well done. The first movement was exceptionally well interpreted.

For its second number, the orchestra played Johann Strauss' musical humoresque, "Perpetuum Mobile." The lifting strains of this light movement were very well received by the audience.

High point of the evening was the double concerto for violins by Johann Sebastian Bach, featuring Richard D. Werner and Harla Lee Wilson as soloists. The interpretation of the two soloists was brilliant.

The program ended with the playing of Carl Maria von Weber's "Oberon" Overture.

S.O.C. President On Northern Trip

On Wednesday, Dr. Stevenson attended a meeting of the Advisory Committee on teacher education in Salem. He was recently appointed to this Committee, which makes recommendations for policies of the State Board of Education.

The memorial service will be conducted in the morning by Anna Harmon of Grants Pass following the tribute to the Past-District presidents given by Elizabeth Faber of Central Point. In the afternoon the election of officers, reports of committees and a round table "Question Box" period led by department president, Mary Fern, will close the convention.

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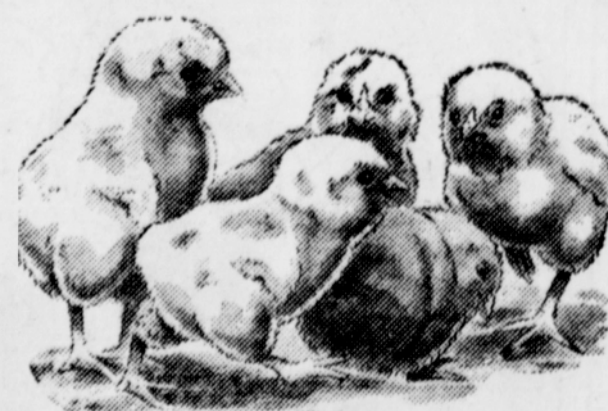
