## Poultry Profits Call For High Production

High production is essential if  
a profit is to be shown by poul-  
trymen during a period such as  
this when feed costs are high  
and eggs are comparatively low  
priced, according to Noel Ben-  
nion, O.S.C. extension poultry  
specialist.

Bennion suggests the follow-  
ing tips on how to maintain egg  
production:  
1. Cull non-laying birds. 2.  
Provide a 13-hour day by use of  
artificial light to stimulate egg  
production. 3. Give a supple-  
mental feeding at noon consist-  
ing of what moist mash or pel-  
lets the birds will clean up in  
20 or 30 minutes.

With 100 pounds of feed, 50  
percent mash and 50 percent  
grains, costing \$4.50 per hundred  
weight, the specialist says feed  
cost per dozen eggs when 10 per-  
cent of birds are producing, will  
amount to \$1.35 per dozen. At  
30 percent production, feed  
costs amount to 45 cents a doz-  
en.

father maintained a stage station  
for the change of horses for the  
soldiers coming and going to  
the battleground.

Patton, a sister, Mrs. T. L. Pow-  
ell, all of Ashland, a grandchild  
and two great grandchildren.

him in death on Dec. 4, 1949.

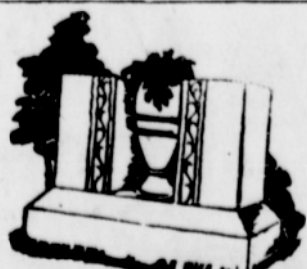
He is survived by a son, John
