tiss M. Everts, of the Oregon State Sanitary Authority, after securing comparative sewage service rates elsewhere, and after discovering that good intention of purpose would satisfy the State Sanitary Authority the committee arrived at its recommendation. This project is also a number one priority. The report of the State Sanitary Authority is appended.

Recommendation:

That the city council immediately raise the sewage service fee from 25c a month to \$1.00 a month by drawing up an appropriate ordinance. This fee will raise \$24,000 a year and provide the funds to correct the sewage disposal plant deficiencies in a piecemeal pattern over a period of five or six years. After the necessary alterations are made the rate should be reduced. The average rate for seventy-five cities in Oregon is 75c, with a range of 25c to \$2.00.

Fire Station and Equipment

This project calls for renovating a purchased garage on Third Street at an estimated cost of \$20,000 and securing additional equipment costing \$10,000.

Funds to be secured as follows: \$30,000 bond issue by vote of the people.

General Outline and Findings

The problem of finding an adequate building for housing fire fighting equipment in a central location has been a long time one. The council in 1949 purchased a building on Third Street which could be remodeled into a fair modern fire station at an estimated cost of \$20,000. It appears now that this amount is a minimal one and that the location is not the best.

Recommendation:

The Interim Committee recommends that the Third Street building be sold and that the present facilities be utilized until a thorough investigation can be made. It might be more desirable for Ashland to have a sub station due to the peculiar feature in its development — spread out along an axis over four miles long and both up and down hill. A modern fire station, or stations are desirable if Ashland is to be a good modern city with excellent fire fighting facilities and housing. This project should be referred to the Ten Year Planning Committee for scheduling and proper presentation to the citizenry.

City Hospital

This project calls for the construction of a thirty bed community hospital at an estimated cost of \$300,000.

Funds to be secured as follows: \$100,000 Federal subsidy (Hill-Burton Act), \$50,000 Sale of present plant, \$50,000 Eleemosynary sources, etc., \$100,000 Bond issue by vote of the people.

General Outline and Findings

For several years this project has waxed and waned and is now before the council because the present hospital has been declared inadequate, out of date, badly located and because federal funds, Hill-Burton Act — are available to cities with high priority. Ashland at present, according to the Hospital Committee, enjoys a rating providing not more than one-third the cost

of the structure from federal funds. The bill will allow a subsidy of as much as two-thirds the cost if the city is rated in dire need. Ashland's hospital is now being operated effectively. New and better sites are available.

Conferences and communications with public health authorities and hospital operators and research of the Bureau of Municipal Research and Service indicates that there are few municipally owned hospital and that there are still fewer being operated by cities in Oregon.

Recommendation:

The Interim Committee recommends continuing the hospital Committee to continuously study ways and means of getting a modern hospital; that no bond issue be presented to the citizens of Ashland until the city enjoys a more favorable federal subsidy rating; and that the citizens should be provided with the opportunity to express their thinking on the matter at the next general plebiscite.

City Library

This proposed project calls for the remodeling and renovating of the present library building at an estimated cost of \$100,000.

Funds to be secured as follows: \$100,000 Bond issue by vote of the citizenry.

General Outline and Findings

This project is another of long standing but recently aggravated by the doubling of the city's population, the rapid growth of the Southern Oregon College and the increased use of library facilities by public school children who have more than doubled in number. Space is sorely needed for book storage as well as reading room. Furthermore, a first floor level entrance is essential if the city's aged are to be adequately served. A modern library face would administer to our city's pride.

Recommendation:

Even though this remodeling is sorely needed, the Interim Committee recommends that the project be given to the Ten Year Plan Committee as one of the first to be presented to the citizens of Ashland for their approval and financial support through a bond issue.

March of Dimes
Tops All Records

Chairman Richard House, announced total receipts of \$18,352.24 for the 1950 March of Dimes. Expenditures for the drive totaled \$1,193.16, leaving a net balance of \$17,159.08, constituting the largest sum ever realized in a Jackson county March of Dimes campaign.

Reporting this highest figure in history of the Jackson County chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, House stated: "Such a total, of course, was due entirely to the unselfish work of the various community leaders and to a very grand response from all Jackson county citizens."

"It is worthy of comment," House continued, "that a large share of the expenses were absorbed by the various chairmen, including all travel, and that the major portion of the publicity was entirely free, being donated by newspapers and radio stations. Publicity photographs were also furnished considerably below costs by Brainerd studios."

A breakdown of the receipts and expenditures, released by House showed the following returns by communities: Medford, \$11,443.92; Ashland, Mr. and Mrs. Don MacWhirter, co-chairmen, \$2,036.57; Central Point, Stanley Jones, Jr. and Charles Myers, co-chairmen, \$597.55; Eagle Point, Glen Hall, chairman, \$556.54; Talent, Mrs. Jack Burdell and Mrs. Nona McAbbe, co-chairmen, \$550.85; Trail and Shady Cove, Mrs. Eva Segessenman, chairman, \$500.09; Jacksonville, Ben Anderson, chairman, \$453.25; Regue River, A. B. Mekvold, chairman, \$341.39; Phoenix, Art MacKintosh, chairman, \$332.31; Prospect, J. H. Grieve, chairman, \$317.75; Gold Hill, Cecil Bell, chairman, \$166.53; Medco logging camp at Butte Falls, W. J. Thomas, chairman, \$163.00. Lions and Lady Lions sponsored the drives at Central Point, Talent, Jacksonville and Phoenix.

In the county as a whole, without specific allocation for towns, the various Granges contributed directly through their organization \$409.69. There will be a luncheon in the Phoenix School cafeteria at 12 noon followed by a workshop.

On Sunday the Conference moves to the Winema Hotel in Klamath Falls for a breakfast at 10 o'clock, at which time there will be a discussion of art education problems, art schools and universities, and a talk, "Can I Make A Living in The Art Field?"
