Local Jersey Cow Wins National Honors

COLUMBUS, O., March 29, 1950 — Governor Pogos Janice, a registered Jersey cow owned by E. B. Poyer of Ashland, Oregon has completed a production record of 8,344 pounds of milk and 482 pounds of butterfat which has qualified her for the Silver Medal award of The American Jersey Cattle Club, with national headquarters in Columbus, O. Governor Pogos Janice's record was made in 305 day actual production at the age of 1 year and 9 months. All her tests were verified by both Oregon State College and The American Jersey Cattle Club.

In compiling this record she produced more than two times as much butterfat as the average dairy cow in the United States.

No Secrets Safe From Uncle Sam; Census Questions Cover Every Field

The world's biggest Quiz program is on for a three week run in every city, hamlet and farm in the United States. On this nationwide show however, there are no fabulous give-away prizes, just an accumulation of headaches for the quizzers and the quizzed. As the army of census takers swarm across the land, doing Uncle Sam's 17th decennial check-up, they are already learning some interesting and embarrassing facts about the way America lives. No skeletons are too safely locked away from the enquiring prober's pencil. However amazing the data may seem to the enumerators their lips are legally sealed forever as far as divulging their findings, nor may they participate in any local gossip or political discussion in their census calling. There are heavy penalties and fines attached to any such infraction of the rules, which helps to mollify any uneasy citizen who may be somewhat irritated by the seeming inquisitive nature of the questionnaire.

The Ashland crew under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Matheny put on a practice enumeration on the 30th of March in order to limber up their pens and to put their intensive training into practice before the official gun sounded April 1st. In the local district which extends from Phoenix to the state line there are twelve enumerators who are covering areas somewhat approximating precinct divisions. Those assigned to the rural and mountainous country have less trouble with swollen feet at the end of the day but they are piling up car mileage for Uncle Sam to pay. The farmer draws the prize questions while each fifth person gets an additional barrage as to financial affairs, property conditions and marital conditions. For some strange reason certain questions are classified as "embarrassing," as for example one's

race, which may not be asked, merely observed and noted (a somewhat technical undertaking), while the most intimate inquiries as to sanitary facilities and family intimacies are calmly asked without a blush, at least on the part of the census taker. After the three week "Quiz" is ended the real tabulation begins which will take several months to complete. It is expected that the mammoth question-

naire will point the way toward many nationwide measures as to housing and rural living conditions as well as show the westward trend of population and industrial growth in the last decade.
