"I have been advised by the West Coast Lumbermen's Association that the Southern Pacific company is taking active steps to assure Oregon shippers of an adequate car supply during the critical transportation months to come," Governor McKay wrote.

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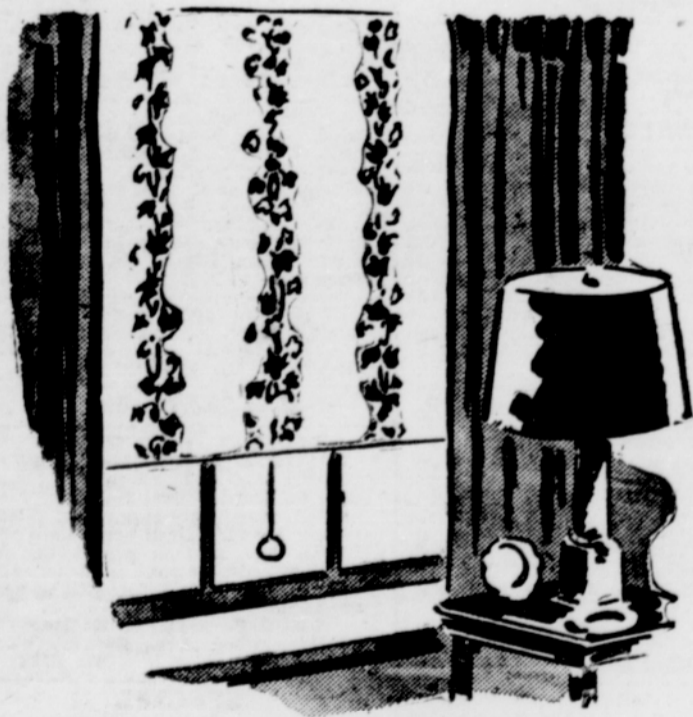
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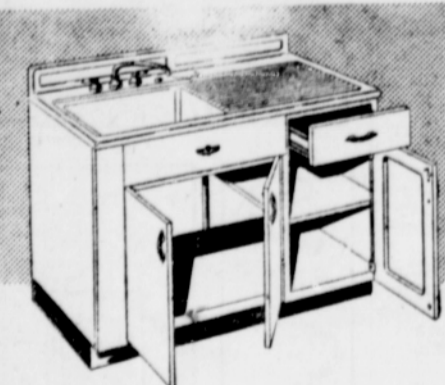
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
