State Motor Group Asks Repeal Auto Excise Taxes

Repeal of the federal automo-
tive excise taxes was urged to-
day by the board of directors of
the Oregon State Motor associ-
ation, AAA motor club in Ore-
gon, according to Dr. E. B. Mc-
Daniel, President.

Dr. McDaniel said the Oregon
AAA club was joining other
AAA clubs throughout the na-
tion in urging the Congress to
"lift the unwarranted excise tax
burden off the shoulders of Am-
erican motorists."

"The excise taxes cost Oregon
motorists approximately \$15,-
979,460 during the year 1949,"
Dr. McDaniel said. "This money
comes from the seven per cent
tax on new cars and motorcy-
cles, five per cent on new trucks,
buses, tractors and semi-trail-
ers, one and one-half cent on
gasoline, six cents a gallon on
oil, five cents a pound on tires,
nine cents a pound on inner
tubes and five per cent on parts
and accessories."

"All these taxes, except the
gas tax, are collected at the
manufacturer's level and there-
fore most motorists do not re-
alize their extent. For the aver-
age new car, the federal excise
tax adds about \$100 to the pur-
chase price."
