Children Need Traffic Education

"The way your child walks, runs, and plays may well determine his future or lack of it," Captain Walter Lansing, head of the state traffic safety division warned Oregon parents today.

Captain Lansing reported that more than one third of the state's pedestrian casualties in 1949 were children under 15 years of age. He declared inadequate safety training and poor example on the part of parents is responsible for a large share of child accidents.

"In more than three-fourths of their accidents, the youngsters were playing in the street, running into the street, or jay-walking. And in far too many of these cases, the child had never been taught that what he was doing was dangerous," the safety official said.

He urged that parents constantly impress the following rules on their children, remembering they are more impressed by example than by words:

1. Streets are for cars—not scooters, tricycles, or play.
2. Cross a street only at the corner, preferably one with a stop sign or signal. Look both ways, then for turning traffic, and cross only when the way is clear.
3. Always walk never run.
4. Remember that bicycles are subject to the same rules and regulations governing automobiles, including careful observance of signs and signals.

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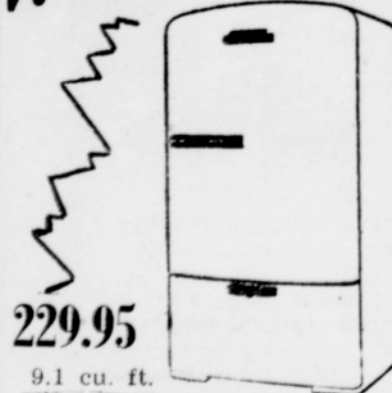

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WHO CALLS HOOVER A 'YOKEL' and Why!

An Open Letter to S. Eugene Allen
Editor of the Oregon Labor Press

Dear Gene:—It is common knowledge that no-one in the state of Oregon thinks less of Wayne Morse than you do. Time and again Joe Battaglia, Heinie Detloff and the others around the table at Hilaire's have heard you denounce Morse as a "commie" sympathizer and political racketeer.

Why, then have you used the old, familiar "commie" smear technique in the last two issues of the Oregon Labor Press calling Dave Hoover an illiterate and unintelligent "yokel?"

You know better, Gene. You know that Hoover has had three years of law training and is well informed on world and domestic problems. He takes short-hand fluently and is an expert typist.
