

Mrs. Stratton Is Honored by DAR

Upper Lithia park is to be the scene of a tree planting ceremony on Thursday afternoon when the members of Mt. Ashland chapter D.A.R. will join in honoring a past regent, Mrs. W. A. Stratton.

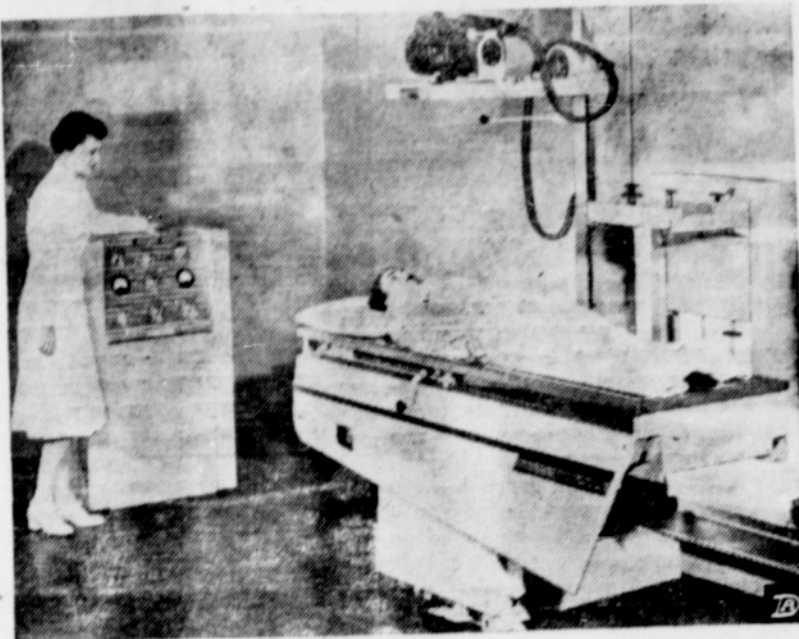
He is survived by his wife, Rilla; a brother Lester of Hillsboro; and a sister Mrs. Bertha Ballard of San Francisco.

New X-Ray Equipment for Small Hospitals



MILWAUKEE, WIS.—A new "stepping stone" line of x-ray equipment which can be constructed into more than 300 different types and models of x-ray machines has just been revealed here by General Electric X-Ray Corporation in a preview demonstration.

The new line was introduced to allow small hospitals and clinics to up-grade their x-ray facilities one step at a time—as their patient load grows and their finances permit.

Maxicon, as the new product is known, will make it possible for even the smallest hospital, industrial medical department or clinic to use x-ray as an aid in diagnosing human illnesses without heavy initial investment. It also means it will be no longer necessary to discard small equipment when patient load demands require larger apparatus.

Two men, starting with a simple 4-legged x-ray table and tube adequate for small hospital and clinic use, systematically added one feature after another. In less than 15 minutes they ended up with a fully outfitted x-ray machine designed for use in large institutions and private radiological offices. This was done with parts from a disassembled unit as they came out of their packing crates. On equipment of earlier design, it often took two men several days to complete the assembly job.

Annual Shrine Ceremonial To Be Conducted in Ashland Saturday

Shriners from Oregon and California will start arriving tomorrow for the annual spring ceremonial to be conducted Saturday by Hillah Temple.

Between 1500 and 2000 visitors are expected to witness and participate in the first ceremonial to be held here in several years.

A pageant, including drilling exhibitions by uniformed units of Hillah Temple and a dramatic skit depicting the Shriners' hospital for crippled children, will be presented for the public at the high school field at 2 p.m.

The day's pilgrimage of Nobles will be headed by Hillah's illustrious Potentate H. H. Mayberry, who will preside with his Divan.

About 150 candidates from all

over the state are to be initiated into the Mystic Shrine during the day long ceremony. Following registration at the Lithia hotel, candidates will be given an escort of the candidates' committee.

Camel Herder's luncheon and initiation is scheduled for noon, to be followed by a business session and then the parade leading up to the afternoon pageant.

Word has been received that 24 Nobles from the Ben All Temple, Sacramento will fly here Friday night. Definite word has not been received from Portland as yet.

Noble William Briggs, as chairman of the affair, is being assisted by Noble Ike Friderger. Director E. C. Jerome and Assistant Director Paul B. Rynning, both past potentates, will give leadership to the ceremonial.

Graduation Set For June 4; 170 Get Diplomas

Graduation exercises have been planned for June 4, at the Lithia Park in Ashland. The graduation and the baccalaureate services will be held in a joint session beginning at 3:00 p.m. If the weather is not suitable the sessions will probably be held in Memorial Court.

There are 170 people eligible for degrees and certificates this year, of these 132 are in Teacher Training. Of the 170 certificates to be presented, 89 will receive B. S. Degrees, 43 three-year certificates and complete other two-year terminal courses. About 50 of the persons receiving the degrees are now on campus and the remainder are out teaching.

The program as outlined will include the invocation and benediction to be given by Reverend Tillman, Baptist Minister of Ashland. Dr. Roderick Langston the President elect of E.O.C.E. will deliver the address at the graduation and Reverend Walter MacArthur of the Roseburg Methodist Church will give the baccalaureate speech. Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge will represent the State Board of Higher Education, of which he is a member. The SOC Band and Orchestra will provide music for the services.

Census Count Nears Completion

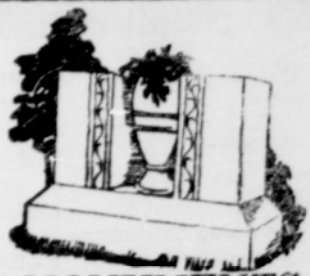
