HOME REPAIR OUTLAY TO REACH BIG TOTAL IN COUNTY FOR 1950

Jackson County home owners will spend an estimated \$1,046,000 on repair and modernization of non-farm dwellings during 1950, according to estimates just released by the Tile Council of America.

"Lower wholesale prices for building products and growing stress on the use of quality materials should greatly benefit Oregon home owners planning repairs this year," declared A. T. Wintersgill, chairman of the Council's residential construction committee.
