Highest scholastic honors of this year's graduating class at Ashland high school went to Miss Joanne Downing, valedictorian, and Kay Beck, salutatorian, who were chosen on the basis of grade averages over a four year period.

In addition to scholastic honors, Miss Downing belongs to the Honor society, Quill and Scroll, Junior Red Cross, Pep club and is organist of her church choir. Her future plans are to attend Northwest Christian college, Eugene and take pre-nursing at the University of Oregon. She is the daughter of

Miss Beck, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Beck, Rt. 1, Box 386, belongs to the Jobs Daughters, Honor society, Debate, school chorus, and Beta Tri Hi Y. She is a member of the Presbyterian church and United choirs and was a delegate to the YMCA youth legislature.

She also plans to take up pre-nursing and hopes to attend the University of Oregon medical school in Portland to complete her nurses training.

7 Local Students Graduate From OSC

Ashland is represented by 7 students in the graduating class of 1982 seniors and graduate students to receive degrees at the 81st annual commencement at Oregon State college, June 5. Saturday, June 3 is alumni reunion day, while the baccalaureate service will be held Sunday, June 4, with Dr. D. V. Poling, famous eastern speaker, giving the address.

This is the largest single class in higher education ever to be graduated in this state, and it may hold the record for some years, officials say. Despite the size, the entire graduation ceremony will be held in the new college coliseum, where relatives of all those receiving degrees will have reserved sections.

Among the degrees to be conferred by President A. L. Strand, 1,813 are either bachelor of science or bachelor of arts, representing four full years of study; 169 are graduate degrees—also a new record—including 149 masters degrees, 3 doctors of education awarded here for the first time, and 17 doctor of philosophy degrees, the highest earned degree in any institution.

Dr. Charles A. Howard, former president of Oregon College of Education will give the address "I Knew Them When They Were Boys." Diplomas will be presented to the graduates by Paul Finnell, chairman of the school board.

Invocation will be given by the Rev. J. C. Green and benediction by the Rev. O. W. Klingensheim. Four numbers will be presented by the high school band and two numbers will be given by the school chorus. Instrumental music is to be under the direction of Clarence Wiggins and vocal music under Donald Evan Davis.

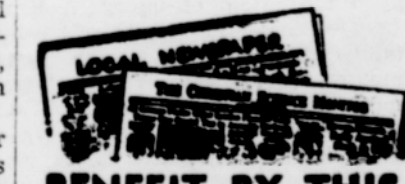

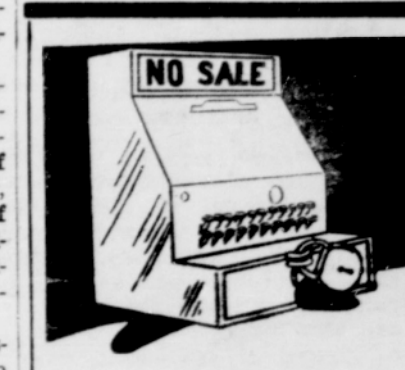
ARVILLA DUDLEY
