Named President Scientist Church

Walter S. Cross of Fitchburg, Mass., has been named president of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., it was announced in Boston today.

Mr. Cross has been active in various capacities in the Christian Science movement, having joined The Mother Church in 1905, and for many years has been a Christian Science practitioner.

During World War I he was an army chaplain with the 89th and 27th Divisions. Later he served at the Christian Science war relief depot at LeMans, France.

Prior to World War I he served as Christian Science committee on publication for the state of Maryland. He has served on the Bible Lesson committee which prepares the lesson-sermons used by all Christian Science churches for their Sunday services.

Mr. Cross is a graduate of Yale university, and an alumnus also of Phillips academy at Andover, Mass. He is a native of Fitchburg, Mass.

Importance of Music To The World Stressed by Piano Class Teacher

Frances Wilde who this week announced the opening of her Summer Piano classes at 1025 Iowa street to be held June 19 to August 11 states these classes are designed to give groups of students piano lessons in keyboard technique, theory and playing.

Mrs. Wilde has had many years of experience as supervisor of public school music and was with the Los Angeles adult education program teaching piano 1, 2, 3 and theory. She began her piano study as a child of eight and has continued her study through years, even while teaching.
