

Bill Doll To Tour U.S.; Health Jaunt

Bill Doll, who has become known to many people in Ashland during the past year, is about to take off on what promises to be an adventurous jaunt. He is making plans to see the United States on a circle walking tour, with his first objective Portland, thence across the northern states to Buffalo, New York City, then down the east coast to Florida and back to San Diego.

Before getting under way officially he is going to Los Angeles where he expects to contact various clothing and sporting goods manufacturers, as well as Ralph Edwards and Art Linkletter of the radio networks, with a view to having several advertising sponsors for his undertaking. He will lecture on the values of walking as well as write a book on his experiences.

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COUNTY BOND DRIVE SALES TOTAL \$5,370

Sales during the second week of the Independence savings bond drive in Jackson county amounted to \$5,370, according to Morris B. Leonard Sr., county campaign chairman.

Total sales in the county to date are \$18,289, or 12 per cent of the \$150,000 quota.

State of Oregon sales reached \$1,055,244 or 17 per cent of the state's \$5,892,000 quota. E. C. Sammons, state chairman of the savings bond division, reported that Oregon ranked in 12th place nationally after the first week of the campaign.

Little Symphony Presents Concert

Ashland music lovers, replete but not surfeited with concerts, during recent weeks, were given a rare treat last Thursday evening when the Southern Oregon Little Symphony orchestra under the direction of Glenn Matthews presented an ambitious program.

Although the Lincoln school auditorium was little more than half filled, the audience displayed a keen appreciation of the classical type of music presented by the well trained 30 piece orchestra. Several new members have been added to the organization during the year making for an excellent balance. The cello section dominated in several numbers and the french horns and oboes showed up well in the lightening familiar measures of the overture to "Die Fledermaus."

The concert marked the first Ashland appearance of Bernard Windt, cellist, who will begin his duties as music instructor in the city schools this fall. Mr. Windt played the solo part in the first movement of Haydn's Concerto in D major which he had also orchestrated. He displayed excellent feeling and technique in the complicated fingering of the allegro passages.

Angus Bowmer's commentary preceding each number added much to the understanding and enjoyment of the selections, while the easy conducting of the orchestra by Glenn Matthews gave the audience a sense of confidence.

In spite of inevitable rough spots the program as a whole showed an unusually fine coordination and balance. The acoustics of the Lincoln auditorium are much better than its lighting and all who attended the concert agreed the overhead glare was annoying. One comment seemed general, "Why does Ashland not have a symphony under the stars?" The idea is worthy of consideration with the Butler Memorial shell offering the necessary facilities for a Hollywood Bowl in miniature.

Judy Briggs Is Roundup Princess
