16-Event Rodeo Planned July 4 by Riding Association

The Fourth of July rodeo and horse races to be held at 2 p.m. July 4 at the Ashland rodeo grounds on the Valley View road, just off highway 99 north of the city limits, will be the 7th in the series sponsored by the Ashland riding association. Members of the association say that this year's program will be the best of the series and that the 16 scheduled events have been planned to offer the maximum in spectator interest.

This will be the fifth year the event has been held at the present grounds. In 1945, when the association was reorganized, 22 acres were purchased at the present site and a building program immediately started. Since that year the expanding program has gone ahead until now there is an excellent 3-8 mile race track, large arena, holding corrals, bucking chutes and a covered grandstand which will seat approximately 2400 spectators. Future plans include a water well, improvements to the grandstand, a new bleacher section and a club house for association meetings.

The Ashland Riding association was originally organized in 1932 as a riding group known as the Ashland Trail Riders. The name was changed in 1945 when the group was re-organized as a stock association with a membership of 21 men. Today there are 54 members with 32 stockholders.

Gragg Threatens Mill Sawdust Suit

The sawdust and soot control question is again literally a burning issue and threatens to break out in an active conflagration the first of July unless the Taylor Brothers Mill complies with the ordinance passed by the city council in April.

Owen Gragg, owner of Twin Plunges, has been a frequent bitter complainant, as his business is dependent upon clean water and sanitary surroundings. After having waited through one swimming season, Mr. Gragg now refuses to postpone the settlement of the nuisance after the first of the month, and says that he intends to bring suit against the offending concern and the city of Ashland. The swimming pool operator contends that the Taylor Brothers Mill has not been equipped with the right type of burner to control flying substance.

The city ordinance reads: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to cause, permit or allow cinders, ash, sawdust or soot . . . to be emitted or discharged from any sawmill burner . . . in such place or manner as to endanger the health, comfort or safety of any person or of the public in any such manner as to cause damage to property or business.

Penalty for the violation of the ordinance calls for a fine of \$100 or imprisonment in the city jail not exceeding 30 days, or both. Each day that a violation of the ordinance occurs shall be considered as a separate offense.

When originally passed, City Attorney Skerry expressed the opinion that the main problem would be the enforcement of such an ordinance, saying that there was no gauge by which to measure the amount of sawdust, soot and cinders which constitutes a "nuisance."

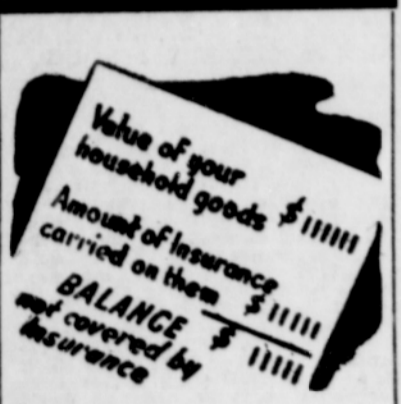
