Winter sports areas in the national forests of Oregon and Washington attracted a total of 427,703 visitors the past winter, according to figures compiled by the U. S. forest service.

Every major area except one showed a decrease in use and the entire Pacific northwest region showed a 20 per cent decrease from the previous year.

The decrease in use was attributed to severe weather and abnormal snowfall, the forest service said.

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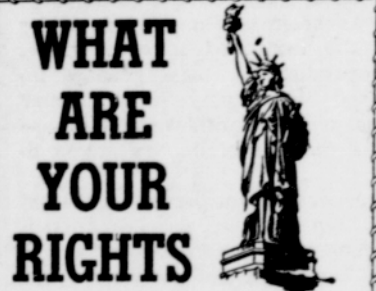
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
