Dr. Bailey Presents Popular Lectures

Some of the disappointment felt by many when they learned that Dr. Margery Bailey would not be among the 1950 Shakespearean players, was mitigated last week when the well known Stanford authority presented three lectures in Medford. Those on Friday and Monday afternoons were given at the Esquire theatre while her Sunday lecture was the feature of the garden party buffet supper held at "Topsides," the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. S. V. Carpenter.

In her first address, Dr. Bailey presented the background and the evolution of humor among primitive peoples as an antithesis to the then much feared evil spirits. "Paradoxical though it seems," said Dr. Bailey, "a sense of comedy differs from a sense of humor, as witness the effect of seeing a man fall down unexpectedly. Humor represents balance while comedy is actually being out of balance."

Her Sunday lecture was of a more popular type in which she gave a vivid word picture of the life and times of Shakespeare, while on Monday she spoke on the tragedies, particularly Henry the Fourth and Antony and Cleopatra, two of the four plays which are on the Festival schedule. As always, Dr. Bailey held the close attention of her audiences with her personality and her dramatic ability to project herself into the characters she portrayed. Falstaff, Antony, Cleopatra and Hotsup all lived and spoke through the lips of the gifted Shakespearean teacher-actress.

KENNETH D. PERRINE
Kenneth D. Perrine, a well known business man and resident of Ashland for more than thirty years, was killed on the morning of July 18, when the chartered plane in which he and three other men were returning from a northern California sawmill repair job, struck a mountain side near Kneeland, Calif.

Mr. Perrine was born at Cripple Creek, Colo., Oct. 2, 1902, moving to Bakersfield, Calif., when he was a boy. He was graduated from the Bakersfield high school and later attended Stanford university. For thirty years he has owned and operated an electrical shop specializing in sawmill motor work and it was while on such a project that he met his death. Several weeks ago he made plans for the purchase of the Third street city property for an enlarged shop and warehouse.

He is survived by his widow, Lolita, a brother, C. R. Perrine of Ashland; a sister, Mrs. Chas. Santo of Klamath Falls, and three daughters, Mrs. Elsa Lightner of Los Angeles; Mrs. Betty Pinkham of Ashland and Miss Rita Golden also of Ashland.

Funeral services were held Saturday morning from the Litwiller Chapel with interment following at Mountain View cemetery.

NLRB Concludes Magnolia Hearing

Hearings in the labor dispute involving two discharged employees of the Magnolia Lumber corporation were held at the county court house in Medford last Thursday and Friday by David Doyle, examiner for the national labor relations board.

H. J. Merrick of Seattle, representing the teamsters' and chauffeurs' union Local 962 (AFL) contended that Edwin Ritter and Charles Rippetoe were discharged in August 1949 because of union activities.

The Magnolia mill, represented by the law firm of Briggs and Briggs, said the two employees were laid off with 11 other men during a slack period and they were not rehired because their work had not been satisfactory.

A decision in the case is expected by the parties in about two months.

Monson Pleads Guilty To Charges of Rape

Medford, July 26—Keith D. Monson, 23, of Route 1, Box 29, Ashland, pleaded guilty in circuit court here Tuesday on a charge of rape. His case has been continued for sentence pending an investigation of his record, according to District Attorney George Neilson.

Police, fire department and ambulance drivers have complained that other drivers are failing to yield right of way, Smith said.

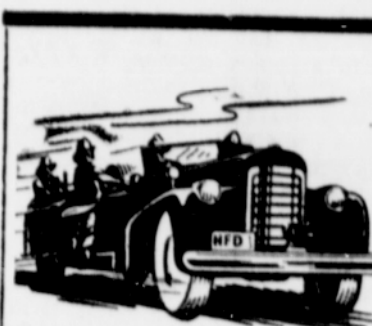

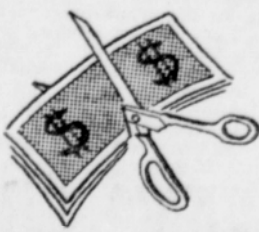
