GET THE FACTS STRAIGHT!

Since Communism has at long last been branded as the real enemy of Christian civilization, many of the false impressions as to its cause, as well as its treatment, should be cleared up without delay.

In the first place there can be no Communist party in the sense of a national political organization, for the prime purpose of the Communist movement as carried on by the parties in every country, is world revolution to be brought about by force and violence or by infiltration and sabotage. In the second place the erroneous impression that Communism is the outgrowth of poverty, hunger, disease and ignorance, should be factually disproved.

Where did Communism get its start? In Germany. Germany has never been a poverty stricken nation. Communism did not develop among the starving millions of Asia or Africa, but among the "intellectuals" of Europe, England and the United States. Its promoters have not been starving zealots but well-heeled educators, play-boys and economic tinkers, beginning with Karl Marx down through Lenin, Browder and Foster to their present day stooges such as Alger Hiss, Dalton Trumbo and Charlie Chaplin.

If you have followed the progress of Communism in this country you will find that it has been supported by millions of dollars given, not by the downtrodden, miserable uneducated masses "yearning to be free," but by wealthy individuals and groups who owe their comfortable incomes to the very system which they swear to destroy. Some of the most prominent American families harbor dangerous traitors.

It's time to do a bit of careful checking so that we may recognize and isolate every Communist whatever specious title he may assume.

LIBERTY — THE FIRST CASUALTY OF WAR

Turn back to Congressman Ellsworth's letter. Read it carefully a second time and ponder on its significance. When, and if, H. R. 9176 becomes law, a virtual dictatorship will have been established under the control of one man, Harry S. Truman. Even conceding the high motives and patriotic intentions of the President, such dictatorial power smacks of the very totalitarianism we Americans have been asked to stamp out in the world and for which American boys have sacrificed their lives. As Mr. Ellsworth says, "Liberty becomes the first casualty of war."

In the light of the general propaganda that the Korean situation is not war, then the proposition to fasten such drastic controls upon the American people under the cloak of the all-inclusive wording — "and to such extent as he shall deem necessary or appropriate to promote the national defense" is alarming. Thus the President would become superior to nearly all federal laws. The phrase "to promote national defense" covers far more than a war, and can be interpreted to include any "emergency."

The record begins to sound very familiar and any person with even the faintest memory will be able to supply the eventual words and music. That the American people can better stand the truth than the deception which was so generally practiced during the late unfinished war is a fact which hasn't yet seemed to percolate through the heads of administration officialdom.

We thank Congressman Ellsworth for his revealing letter in spite of its gloomy aspect. We too have grown mighty tired of the old "hush hush" technique and the aura of "sweetness and light." Americans can stand the truth IF they can be sure they are getting it.
