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Council Conducts Routine Business

The city council Tuesday night authorized City Superintendent Elmer Beagle to secure bids for curbs, gutter and sidewalks for Avery, Madrone, Indiana and Hargadine streets. Paving of the streets is to be done later by the city.

Petitions were submitted by the Briscoe school P.T.A. requesting a manually operated traffic control light to be installed on North Main street at the school. Beagle reported that last year cost of such a light was \$750 and he estimated the cost to be approximately 20 per cent higher now. The request was referred to the finance committee. Bills, claims and payrolls amounting to \$35,870.71 were read by City Recorder John Austin and approved for payment by the council.

The annual salary ordinance covering all city employees was passed with two changes. Salaries of the fire chief and cemetery superintendent were increased from \$3,420 to \$3,600.

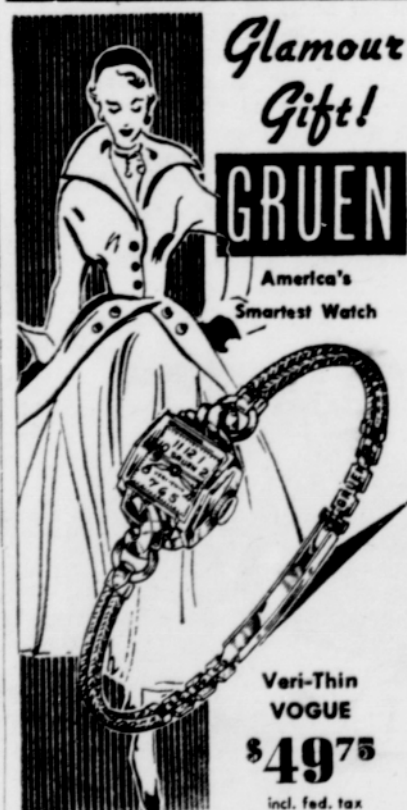

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Additions Made To SOC Faculty

Appointment of four new faculty members on the staff at Southern Oregon college beginning with the opening of fall quarter was announced this week by Dr. Elmo Stevenson, college president.

William Tod Dawkins will be instructor in English and director of public information. He comes to Southern Oregon college from the University of New Mexico where he has been in the English department. Prior to that he was at Franklin and Marshall college, also as instructor in English. As a student he attended the University of North Carolina, Franklin and Marshall, University of Pennsylvania, and University of New Mexico. Dawkins' background in news reporting is from experience in the news field itself as news editor for the Richmond County Journal, Rockingham, North Carolina and reporter and feature writer for the Lancaster, Pennsylvania Sunday News.

Mr. and Mrs. Dawkins will arrive in Ashland in time for the beginning of the fall quarter.

Helene Robinson will join the faculty in music education. Miss Robinson comes here from Arizona State at Flagstaff. Her special field of interest is the piano. She has been at Arizona State since 1942 and is making the change because she wants to live in Oregon. She attended the University of Oregon, Northwestern university, Mills college and Arizona State college.

Marjorie Williams Priger will be instructor in education. She comes to Southern Oregon college from a position as supervisor of the DeBusk reading clinic at the University of Oregon. Miss Priger has specialized in special education in the fields of testing, remedial reading and psychology of the exceptional child. She has also been director of the special education program at Corvallis. Miss Priger attended Huron College, University of California at Los Angeles and the University of Oregon. She is a member of Delta Kappa Gamma, Phi Lambda Theta and the Sororists.

Dr. William A. Sampson, assistant professor of education, comes as a member of the staff from the University of Oregon where he was instructor in education. In addition to his field of education, he has been interested in social science, psychology and political science.

Dr. and Mrs. Sampson will make their home in Ashland, arriving the later part of August.

One would think that for the performance Bowmer must turn his soul into that of an obese and cynical rogue, as readily as he makes his voice hoarse, elderly, dissolute. And, Lord! how funny he is, how really and fundamentally funny. Caught in his outrageous lie in that incomparable tavern scene, he can make the very muscles of his back express his split-second decision to get out of it with another lie, aid never mind if nobody believes it. One forgets that the man is Angus Bowmer, whom from all reports nobody in the Festival could spare.
