Rededication Climaxes Church 75th Anniversary

After three days of meetings and reunions, the Diamond Jubilee of the First Presbyterian church closed Monday evening with a rededication and reconsecration service, participated in by more than 200. The anniversary dinner was the climax to the week-end celebration and was attended by the largest crowd of the sessions and included many of the older members of the church and the community, several in old time dress.

The Mariners' club served the bountiful "pot-luck" dinner at long flower and taper centered tables which stretched across the entire church and adjoining Sunday School rooms.

The program presided over by the pastor, Rev. George Shuman, was an interesting composite of several generations of church members beginning with Harvey Woods, cornetist, accompanied by Nancy Dunkeson and Kathleen Hartley, who played two piano solos. The popular "Long-fellows" male quartet composed of E. P. Bradshaw, W. M. Wright, J. W. McCoy and G. M. Frost was well-received for their spirited rendition of several old time songs.

Mrs. James Edgar read more than fifty letters and wires of greetings which had been received, including one from Governor Douglas McKay. Rev. Earl Downing representing the Ministerial Association, brought best wishes from the Ashland churches.

Descendants of charter members and visiting guests were introduced and each brought personal greetings or reminiscences of years gone by, ranging from the sublime to the ridiculous.

In a spirit of reverence and solemnity, the final service came as a fitting culmination to the series of observances which marked the beginning of the 75th year in the life of the Presbyterian church. As the congregation stood with bowed heads they repeated in unison the closing prayer of rededication of the church: "Here may the faithful find salvation, and the careless be awakened. Here may the doubting find faith, and the anxious be encouraged. Here may the tempted find help, and the sorrowful comfort. Here may the weary find rest, and the strong be renewed. Here may the aged find consolation, and the young be inspired. Amen."
