He has had previous fire department experience. No replacement has as yet been selected, Smith said.

Unemployment Claims For Last Week in August Low

Unemployment claims dropped to 7,475 during the last week of August, lowest figure in nearly two years, while payments for the month were \$620,978, less than half the August, 1949, total, the state unemployment compensation commission reported this week.

Approximately half of those without jobs were from trade and service lines, while cannery workers numbered nearly a sixth of the total. Only a few hundred were from logging, lumbering and other heavy manufacturing, where skilled workers were in demand because of defense production needs, the report said.

JOHN SANFORD OWENS

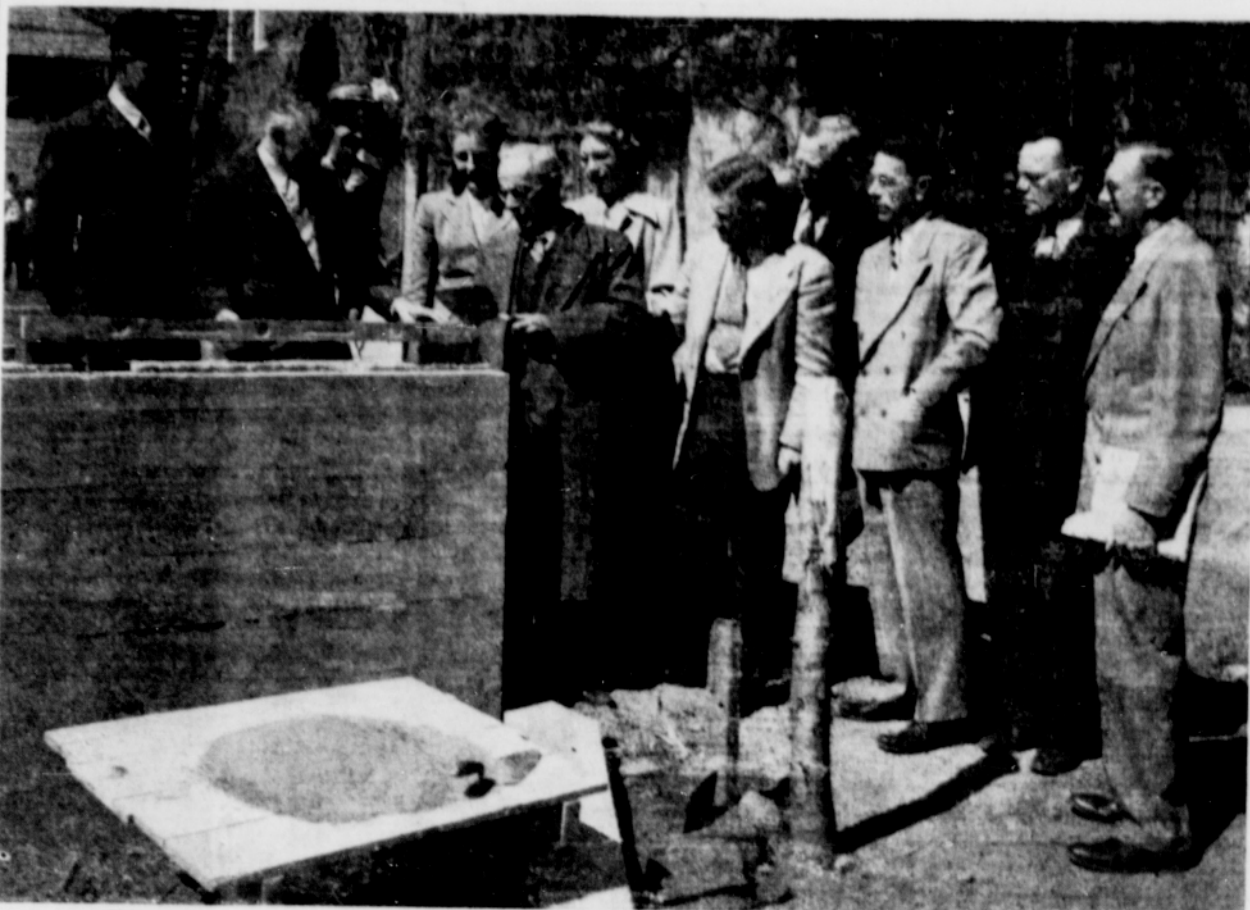
