

### Two Cases of Whooping Cough Reported Locally

Two cases of whooping cough in Ashland were on the list of communicable diseases for last week released by the Jackson county health department.

Medford had one case of tuberculosis, one infectious hepatitis, one infectious mononucleosis and one strep throat. One case of mumps was reported from Prospect.

### Drivers Urged to Observe Oregon School Bus Law

School children, estimated at 100,000 strong, are now riding Oregon school buses in all sections of the state, the state traffic safety division reported this week.

By the end of school next spring, aggregate school bus travel in the state will reach ten million miles.

The safety of the young passengers, the division points out, depends in large measure on how well drivers observe necessary caution when encountering a school bus.

Violations of this law brought 250 arrests by state police during the 1949-50 school year, the division said.

From Undaunted Pioneers By Mary Hill Dunn

About the first of August, 1853, we noticed that the Indians were beginning to act strangely. One day a big fellow came to the door when mother and we girls were alone in the cabin.

### INDUCTEES OFFERED FREE LEGAL ADVISE

rolled up in blankets on the floor, and we could hear the squaws and the children and the men on guard walking back and forth. We were glad when daylight came, so we could at least see what was going on.

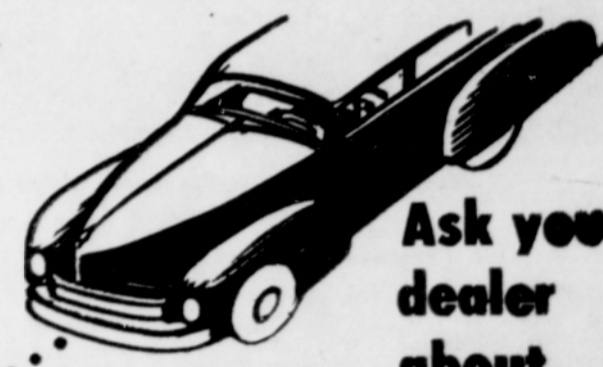
