his faith in the ability of the American people to unify in an emergency, but voiced amazement at the growing lack of interest in government that kept 50 per cent of the voters away from the polls in 1948. He said Americans do not protect their citizenship as well as they do their material possessions. "We must go back to the principles of citizenship that existed in the Gay Nineties when 90 per cent of the voters voted."

The governor was introduced at the college assembly by Dr. Elmo Stevenson, SOC president. Cliff Wolfe, president of Sigma Alpha Sigma, college speech fraternity, was chairman.

Mayor Phil Stansbury introduced Governor McKay at the evening banquet and also introduced presidents of the city's service clubs, who sponsored the appearance here.

ADVISES ON SHADE TREE SELECTION

Now that the first frosts have started, leaves will be falling from our shade trees and as soon as this leaf drop is completed, there are a lot of home owners who will be anxious to set out some new trees.

If your soil is well drained, fall planting is better than spring planting, as the trees have a better chance to become rooted before the weather turns warm. Where the soil is heavy and wet, then it is better to wait until spring so the newly planted tree does not drown during the winter.

The selection of these shade trees poses a serious problem to home owners, as a poor selection will be a headache for many years to come. The first thing to decide is whether you want a deciduous tree, which is one that loses its leaves in the wintertime, or whether you prefer an evergreen. A deciduous tree has the advantage of providing excellent shade in the summertime and then allowing more sun to come through onto the house and yard during the winter. In selecting one of these we generally want a tree which is rapid growing and one which will remain reasonably free from attack of insect pests and diseases. This is quite an order, but there are a few trees which fulfill these requirements. Three of the best of these are the sycamore tree, the tulip tree and the sweet gum. Of the evergreen trees, the deodar, cedar is a very striking specimen and grows about as rapidly as any of the evergreens.

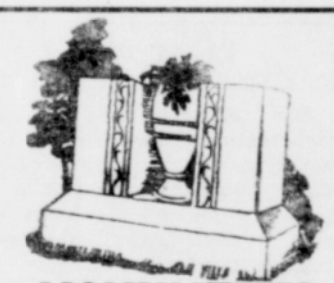
WILLIAM S. VANDYKE

increase in size the top sides of the roots frequently force themselves above the surface of the ground. This makes them look a little untidy and somewhat difficult to mow over. Generally speaking, a sycamore tree should never be planted closer than 10 feet to a sidewalk or a foundation.

Seed Pods Problem

The tree is characterized by large leaves with 3 lobes and serrated edges. They also produce seed pods which resemble Christmas ornaments hanging on a long stem. Many of these remain on the tree during the winter. As a result, the tree is somewhat dirty on the lawn. The leaves come off fairly promptly in the fall, but the continual dropping of these seed pods makes periodic cleaning up necessary.

Where a large, quick growing tree is desired, it is difficult to do better than the sycamore. In Ashland some very fine specimens are growing in the Lithia Park just before you get to the band stand. Anyone interested in planting these trees might do well to look them over first to see just what they would be growing.
