

City Police Have Busy September

Ashland police made 49 arrests, issued 225 warnings for minor offenses and received 416 formal complaints during September, according to the monthly report submitted to the city council Tuesday night by Chief of Police Vern Smith. Twenty-nine traffic accidents occurred in the city during the month, according to the report.

Of the arrests made, 25 were for traffic violations and 24 non-traffic. Violation of the basic rule, driving without an operator's license and illegal parking were the most frequent traffic violations. Charges involving drunkenness accounted for 13 of the other arrests.

Revenues for the month, including fines, forfeitures and parking meter fines totaled \$998.50 and other income amounted to \$11.60. The value of merchandise, personal property, cash and bad checks recovered was estimated at \$500.37.

According to the report, city police also recovered one stolen bicycle, found 37 windows or doors unlocked, questioned 37 hitch-hikers, disposed of 4 animals, fingerprinted 16 persons, reported 28 street lights out and returned one lost child to his parents.

Tourist Income At Record High

Salem—Oregon's 1950 tourist business brought an estimated 113 million dollars into the state, according to estimates by the Oregon state highway commission travel information department.

This represents a gain of roughly three per cent over the income for 1949, the previous high year. Figures are based on state highway department traffic checks of out-of-state automobiles at 14 major points of entry.

The survey reveals that the average daily expenditure per person was \$5.24. Each out-of-state car represented an expenditure of \$115.89, based on an average occupancy of 2.8 persons per car and an average stay of 7.9 days in Oregon. Motorists who stayed in campgrounds, as well as those who patronized hotels, auto courts and resorts, were interviewed to provide a thorough cross section of Oregon vacation travel.

Approximately 784,750 cars visited Oregon during the year with average mileage of 744 miles for each, officials said.

Oregon attracted visitors from every state in the union, with California leading motor travel by reason of its proximity and large population. The states of Washington and Idaho were second and third, followed by Canada and Illinois.

Poyer Cows Win Again

Again E. B. Poyer of Ashland has won national award honors with his registered Jerseys. The Gold Star herd award was won for an unusually high production record over a four year period, and was given at the national headquarters of the American Jersey Cattle club at Columbus, Ohio.

Last year Poyer's nine cows had an average production of 7465 lbs. of milk and 437 lbs. of butterfat. Over the past four years, Poyer has had an average of eight cows in his herd producing 8435 lbs. of milk and 497 lbs. of butterfat apiece. This is more than two times greater than that of the average dairy cow in the United States.

PORCUPINE CLAIMED FOREST RENEGADE

The porcupine has been declared to be renegade of the forest and local U.S. forest service officials have asked hunters and campers to shoot him on sight.

L. G. Jolley, county forest service supervisor, in asking for assistance from hunters said that, contrary to popular opinion, porcupines are not protected by game laws.

Porcupines are destructive rodents, having killed or deformed thousands of young trees during the summer, he said. They should not be spared as possible food for people lost in snowstorms, because porcupines don't cooperate that way; when snow gets deep they hide in rocky dens.

Jolley had these tips for hunters who want to help get rid of "Porky": Use .22-caliber long rifle hollow-nosed bullets. Aim for the head. Look at trees silhouetted by the sun.

Physically Handicapped Termed Essential Help

Governor Douglas McKay said this week that the very existence of American freedom and democracy may be determined in a large measure by the full utilization of all available manpower, including seriously disabled men and women.

He issued the statement in connection with the sixth annual observance of National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week, October 1 through 7.

"In other years I have stressed that it is, good business to hire a person who, though disabled, is fully qualified for a particular job," the governor said. "While that fact still holds true, it is imperative that full utilization of manpower be achieved at the earliest possible date. I commend all individuals who are giving so much to put the idea across that it not only pays to hire the handicapped—we must."

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
