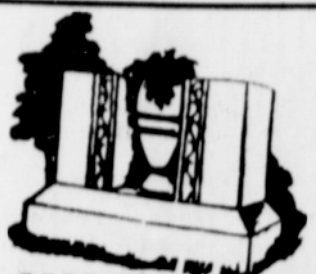

Lyrics of the first vocal number, "Oregon Song," sung by Zoe Peters, were written by Mrs. Blanche Huffman and the accompanying music by Mrs. Ernestine Hartley, who also composed the music for "Pansy Ann," written by Mrs. Emil Tucker and sung by Mrs. Peters with Mrs. Hartley at the piano.

Authors of several poems read their own verses, including "Joy Cometh in the Morning" by Mrs. Myrtle Nutter; "Music

Woods, composer of the music, sang "Our Civic Home," which was written by Mrs. Margaret Diehl 25 years ago at the time of the dedication of the present club house. Church Women Hear Vivid Story Of Passion Play

The October meeting of the Women's Association of the Presbyterian church was held on last Thursday beginning with the customary devotional half hour at 10:30, led by Mrs. James Edgar. In the absence of the president, the vice-president, Mrs. R. M. Attwood presided over the morning business session.

Many of the committee chairmen reported and the bazaar plans were definitely completed with the date being set for the first Saturday in December and the Trinity Parish house being the place chosen.

The luncheon hostesses were Mrs. W. D. Jackson, Mrs. Sherman Madley, Mrs. Cora True and Dr. Bertha Sawyer. The afternoon program was in charge of Mrs. W. M. Poley who conducted the opening devotional service of songs and scripture appropriate to the subject for the afternoon. She then presented Mrs. Louise Perrozzi, who described with vivid and impressive narration the world famed Passion Play presented at Oberammergau which she witnessed last summer.

Mrs. Perrozzi gave the historical background of the play which has been presented since 1633 as the result of a solemn vow to perform the Holy story every decade if the village might be spared from the ravages of a deadly plague. The descendants of many of the original actors carry the parts of the Biblical characters. She held the rapt attention of her hearers as she pictured the breathtaking grandeur of the mountains and star-studded skies as a backdrop for the old familiar story of the life of Christ.
