Traffic Deaths in State Total 290

Salem, Oct. 11—Oregon traffic accidents killed 40 persons last month to bring the state's death toll for the first nine months of the year to 290, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry reported.

The death count was 237 last year at the same time.

Most of the upsurge came during the heavy travel of July and August as well as last month, Newbry said, with 149 lives lost in those three months alone. Thirty-five of the September fatalities resulted from accidents taking place on rural roads and highways, as against five in the cities.
